# Ag Ed Majors Find First Class Is Most Difficult Class Period

Fifty-eight agriculture education majors have completed one week of practice teaching, E. V. Walton of the Agriculture Educa-tion Department, reported vester-

Walton says that 62 more are to do practice teaching by the end of the semester. The 20 high school vocational agriculture departments that students are teaching in extend from Navasota to Abilene. Students taking practice teach-

ing are required to teach a full week in these departments. They are assigned a subject to teach by the vocational agriculture teacher and must work out a teaching plan of their subject for

Walton said that most students report some difficulty the first day especially in finding enough to talk about for one or two hour period, but the rest of the week their teaching procedure goes rather smoothly. One of the biggest discoveries that students make is that high school boys think, and some of them think plenty fast.

These students are visited, on alternating weeks, by Walton and Henry Ross of the Agriculture Education Department. The purpose for their visiting students is to help them with any problem that they might encounter while teaching.

Most students are more enthusiastic about teaching vocational agriculture after taking practice teaching. Walton said. Out of 120

## Hays and Powell Return From Meet

Dr. J. Q. Hays and F. W. Pow-ell of the English Department have just returned from a trip to the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma City where they attended a meeting of the South Central Modern Languages Association.
