Replaces Old Model . . .

Guion's Facelifting Includes New Electric Organ, Chimes

The most voluminous thing since the Houston Symphony orchestra will grace Guion Hall beginning Friday in the form of a Wurlitzer electrical organ.

Equipped with 80-watt amplifiers and Maas chimes, the organ will be placed in the right hand corner of Guion below the stage.

The organ, which was purchased last spring, has been repositioned in the organ room of the Music Hall. Bill Turner, director of the Aggieland Orchestra and Singing Cadets, was largely responsible for securing the instrument.

Built to represent the tones and quality of a great pipe organ, this electrical organ is really three organs combined into one.

Different tones are effected by blowing winds through the hundreds of reed pipes within the organ case. Small wires, each of which acts as a separate microphone, are connected to the pipes and are used to pick up the tone through electrical impulses.

The Guion organ is a far cry from the world's finest organ built by the Egyptians and called a water organ. A crude form of windmill was set up which blew wind through pipes so that certain desired musical affects could be attained.

The organ as we know it today was perfected in the latter part of the Renaissance and the beginning of the Romantic Era and the Machine Age.

Work has been completed on the old organ which was replaced by the Wurlitzer. It stood for 13 years in Guion. It is now in fairly good condition and is located in the Music Hall for all those students interested in playing it.

The old organ will also be used to play at banquets at Sbis and for special occasions on the campus.

Sosolik Named WTAW Manager

Frank J. Sosolik, 40, chief engineer of radio station WTAW since 1942, has been named manager of the station, it was announced today. He had been serving as acting manager for the past two months.

Raised in Bryan, Sosolik became interested in the radio business as a youngster, "hanging around the old WTAW setup when the studios were in the YMCA and the transmitter in the Electrical Engineering Building," he said.

Sosolik studied radio communications course at the Tyler School of Radio in 1932, and received his license.

After taking radio communications courses as a special student in Electrical Engineering at A&M he worked as engineer for station KTRH, Houston, assisting in installation of their 50,000 watt transmitter. He returned to A&M in 1943, as chief engineer for WTAW.

Sosolik is married and has two children, Frank, Jr., 11, and Sylvia 13. His home is in Bryan.
