Visual Aids Department Began As One Room Laboratory in '41

A&M's Visual Aids Department, point of origin of many of the moving pictures, charts and illustrated materials used in classroom has developed from a one-room laboratory to its present position.

The original laboratory was originally located in the Agricultural Experiment Station and classes as a branch of that department. In 1941 it was moved to the basement of the Administration Building and became a separate department.

The department, equipped to produce almost any form of visual education, serves all other departments in presenting visual aid to various classes.

"The object of this department is not to make teaching an easier job, but to help the professor do a better job, which will eventually save time by making students understand more easily the points being presented," Howard Berry, head of the department, said.

The laboratory is composed of four dark-rooms, a preview room, a repair room and two other rooms in which lithographing, print making, sketching, illustrations, photostats, and other types of photography are handled.

It is equipped to make photographs, motion pictures, natural color pictures, land slides, photomicrographs, offset lithographs, and illustrations, as well as to repair and maintain projectors and other photographic equipment.

Berry points out that work done by the department is for the benefit of the various departments and personnel of the college only. He expects future services to be added to department as the demand for them grows.

Policies of the department are set up by the photographic visual

aids committee composed of representatives of each school in each division of the college.

Berry came to A&M in 1931 after graduating from Mississippi State College and began working in the Agricultural Experiment Station as a photographer. He served three years in the Navy during the war as a lieutenant and photographic officer.

Assistants in the Visual Aids Department include Mrs. Gerald Dean Rutledge, secretary; Roy P. Hargett, photographer; Charles Gebauer, technician; Ollie Wilson, illustrator; and Mrs. Alice Brocksmith and Margaret Parker, laboratory assistants.
