

# Corps Trip Conduct, Appearance Earns Praise of Board Member

The A&M student body has been commended for its behavior and appearance in Dallas during the annual corps trip by a member of the college Board of Directors.

Tyree L. Bell, captain of the Aggie football team in 1911 and 1912 and member of the Board, wrote Dean of Men W. L. Penberthy that "the appearance and conduct of the Cadets set a new high for a Corps trip."

The text of the letter follows: "During this entire week we A&M folks who are resident in Dallas have been covered up with compliments concerning the outstanding fine showing that A&M College representatives made during their Corps trip visit this last week-end."

The football game played by the Aggies astounded all who saw it. Those who do not understand Aggie spirit can not understand how a team with such a record as ours could rise up and give the champions such a battle as they saw. I do not like to lose, yet I was more impressed with the performance of stay A&M team than I was over that gang of ours that gave the Mustangs such a surprise.

The military showing of the Corps was superb; the parade itself and the appearance and conduct of the Cadets set a new high for a Corps trip. Those who in any way contributed to the success of the undertaking, which very definitely it was, are due the congratulations and appreciation of all who take pride in the reputation of our Cadet Corps.

But the particular purpose of this letter is to tell you of my own great personal satisfaction over the conduct of our student body while in Dallas. The criticism of past years is entirely wiped out and in its place I hear only commendation for fine sportsmanship.

I have been told that a certain high-SMU official made the statement out on the Hilltop that the Aggies this year in their visit to Dallas set an example for gentlemanly conduct and fine sportsmanship that could well be imitated by all other student bodies, and that he could ask nothing more of his own students than when they went visiting, that they would conduct themselves as creditably as had the Aggies.

I am tremendously proud of such approval and I know that you will be.

# Dr. Phillips to Speak During Methodist Thanksgiving Meet

Dr. Lee Phillips, chaplain of Prairie View A&M College, will be the principal speaker at the Annual Thanksgiving Conference of the Texas Methodist Student Movement. The conference with the A&M Methodist Church will begin on the morning of Nov. 26 and end at noon Nov. 28 Ferris Baker director of the College Wesley Foundation, announced today.

The theme of the convention will be "Call to Concerned Living."

Rev. Phillips is scheduled to deliver four speeches: "Jesus and Concerned Living," "The Ideal and the Real," "The Christian Life as Evangelism," and "Our Commitment to Concerned Living."

Rev. Donald M. Redmond of the First Methodist Church at Kingsville will discuss "Concerned Living in the Local Community," Baker said.

Other speakers at the convention will be Rev. George Harper, executive secretary of the National Conference of Methodist Youth at Nashville, Tennessee; Rev. John Deschner, Jr., executive secretary of the United Student Christian Council of New York City; and Dorothy Nyland of the Board of Missions from New York City, Baker announced.

A special event of the conference will be a worship drama to be presented by the Lon Morris College Players.

The visiting ministers are to lead small groups in "workshops" for training purposes and seminars, Baker said.
