They are: Chuck Bed-narik of Pennsylvania at center, Bill Fischer of Notre Dame at tackle and Doak Walker of SMU in the backfield. Bednarik, a 233 lb., 6 ft. 3 in, senior, calls Bethlehem, Pa., his home town. Bednarik, who is also used as a punter is an Air Corps veteran.
