Plenty of good photos and drawings, arranged in eye-pleasing manner add to the magazine's consistent style.

Lyle Blankenship carries readers through a six-week field trip to the Colorado Rockies where he and his classmates studied wild-life and experienced hardships familiar to greenhorns in the wilderness.

US Supreme Court to Review Trials of Jap War Leaders

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(P)—A dramatically broken Supreme Court tie gave seven former Japanese warlords a new lease on life today—the seventh anniversary of the day of infamy they helped plot.

Splitting five to four, the tribunal agreed yesterday to consider whether it can pass on the findings of the international court in Tokyo which doomed the men to hang as war criminals.

In no event will the court pass on the guilt or innocence of the Japanese. But it will hear arguments Dec. 16 on (1) whether it has any power to intercede and, if so, (2) whether the 11-nation war crimes tribunal at Tokyo was legally set up.

In the case before it yesterday, the court actually dealt with only two of the seven men sentenced to hang and only five of the 18 who drew prison terms.

Former Premier Hideki Tojo and four others sentenced to hang asked no intervention. In a soul-searching, six-page memorandum explaining his action, Jackson said he decided to break the tie at a court conference last Saturday. His hope, he said, is that "fuller argument and hearing will convert one or more of the justices on one side or the other from the views that have equally divided them in the German case."

He added that the hope that it will not be necessary for him to vote in the final decision but he specifically reserved the right to do so.
