Applications are still being accepted from students of all departments for this six-hour credit course, Meador added. The main obstacle, transporta-

travel on a government all-student ship. Present plans call for departure from either New Orleans or New York in the first part of June. England will be the initial stop for the students before sailing for Paris.

The Eiffel city will be a central location from which the students will visit the cities of Chartres, Orleans, Blois, Tours, Angers, Nantes, Rennes, Mont-St. Michel, Vire, Caen, Rouen, Beauvais, and Chantilly. Side trips will be taken from Paris to Versailles, Fontainebleau, Senlis, Reims, and other smaller cities.

From Paris the group will invade Southern France, touching the historic cities of Nerves, Clermont-Ferrand, Le Puy, Nîmes, Avignon, Aix, and Marseille. High point of interest in this area will be the trip to the famous Roman aqueduct-bridge, Pont du Gard, which was built in 245 A.D.

From Marseille the tour will touch at the French Riviera and continue through Genoa and down to Rome. Several days will be spent visiting the historic buildings in Rome, and then the tour will turn northward to Florence, Venice, and Milan.

From Milan the agenda includes a trip through the Simlon Tunnel in the Alps to Switzerland, Interlaken, Lucerne, Verne, and then to the quaint Grand Duca, Capitol of Luxemburg. From there they stop at Brussels, the capitol city of Belgium, before moving across the channel to England.

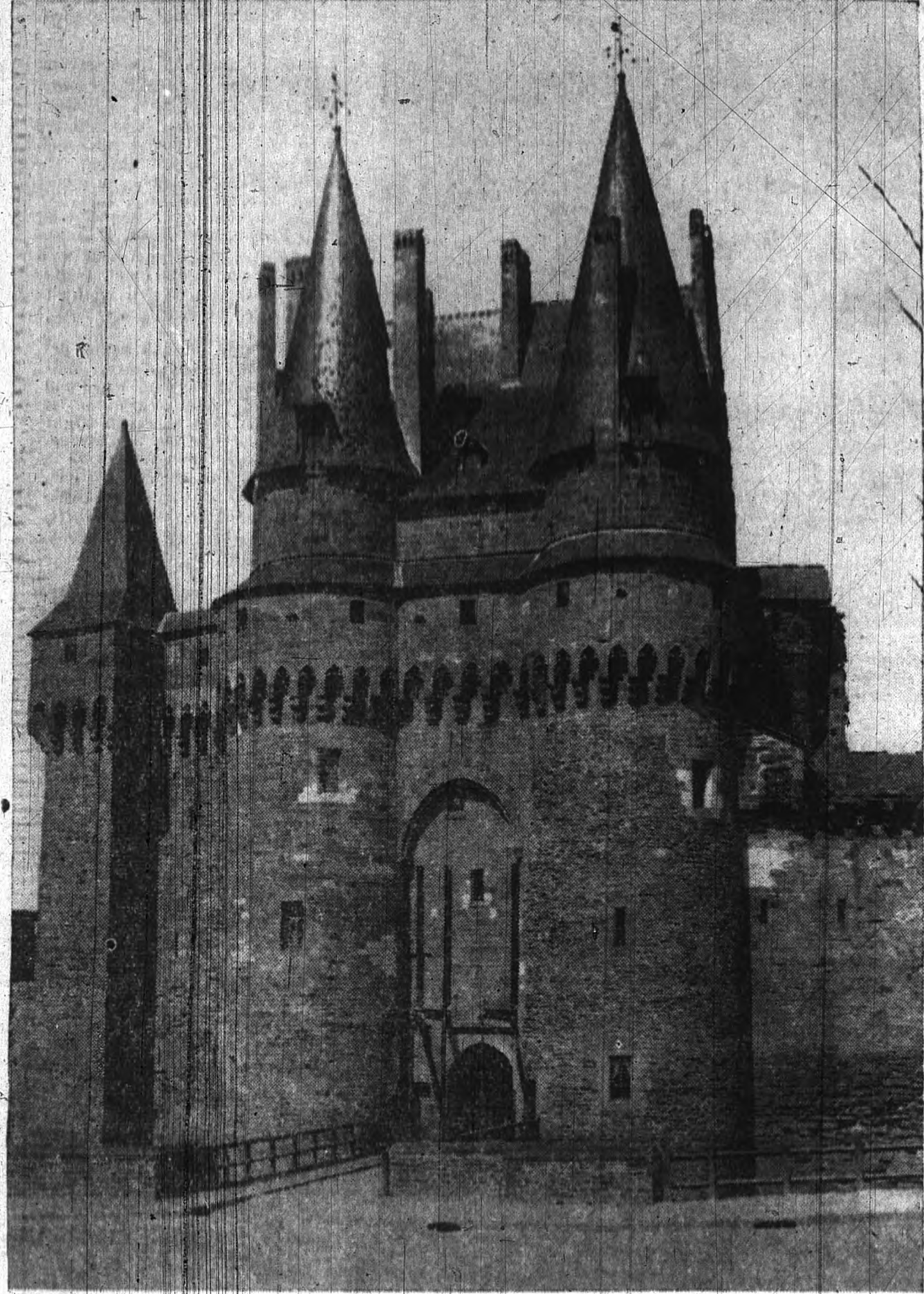
London, Oxford, Liverpool, Cambridge, and intermediate points are the scheduled sights for England.

The tour is being planned with particular emphasis and interest directed toward students majoring in architectural design, city planning, large housing developments, modern bridge and highway construction, landscape architecture and related fields, Meador said.

However, this trip will also be valuable simply as an educational experience, he added. The class is open to both graduate and non-graduate students of the college. The estimated cost is \$800 to \$1,000, which will include round-trip trans-Atlantic steamship passage, passport, and custom fees. Also covered will be train and bus fares in Europe, hotels, food and registration. Personal expenses for gifts and tips are not included in this figure.

Arrangements are being made for the Veterans Administration to pay part of the registration fee for veteran students, Meador said. Men on the tour are eligible for subsistence payments for the three-months period.

Final date for registration will be April 1, at which time the tuition fee of \$35 and the filed trip fee of \$40 will be required. Complete information on the tour may be obtained from Meador in the Architecture Department.

WRECKED TANKER PLANE LOCATED

MANILA, March 16.—(AP) The wreckage of a missing superfort tanker plane was seen from the air yesterday on a mountainside 25 miles from Manila but ground rescue teams had not been able to reach it today.

Search planes spotted the wreckage but saw no sign of life around it. The B-29 had been missing with a crew of nine since March 1 when it refueled the non-stop globe girdling B-50 Lucky Lady II and failed to return from its mission.

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Gilmer-Aiken Bill Reorganized To Meet Major Objections

Gilmer-Aiken school reorganization bill designed to meet major objections to it were proposed yesterday by Rep. George Nokes of Corsicana.

They will be included in a substitute for Senator Jim Taylor's senate-approved measure to be heard at a house education committee meeting tonight.

The elective state board of education proposal in Taylor's bill would be increased from 9 to 21 members under the Nokes plan. It would add a new section making it clear that the act gives no authority to the board of education, the Department of Education or the commissioner of education to close or consolidate any independent or common school district.

Any textbook or bond company would be forbidden to contribute to campaign funds for board of education members, and the new bill would clearly state that the state commissioner of education would be strictly subject to rules and regulations of the board.

Joining Nokes in offering the substitute will be Reps. William George Richards of Lockhart, Jeff Woodruff of Pasadena, William A. Schmidt of Commerce, Bill Tipton of Abilene, Dolph Briscoe Jr., of Uvalde, John E. Morrison Jr., of Quanah.

The revised bill would also provide that the commissioner of education shall be a citizen of Texas, and that rules and regulations for issuance of teachers' certificates be set up by the board of education.

Opponents of the Gilmer-Aiken proposals have said it would result in the closing of many rural schools. They have attacked the plan for electing the nine-member board of education as not being sufficiently democratic.

One of the chief complaints was against appointing the state superintendent. Nokes said he thought increasing the size of the board and clarifying its supervisory powers over the superintendent should answer that.
