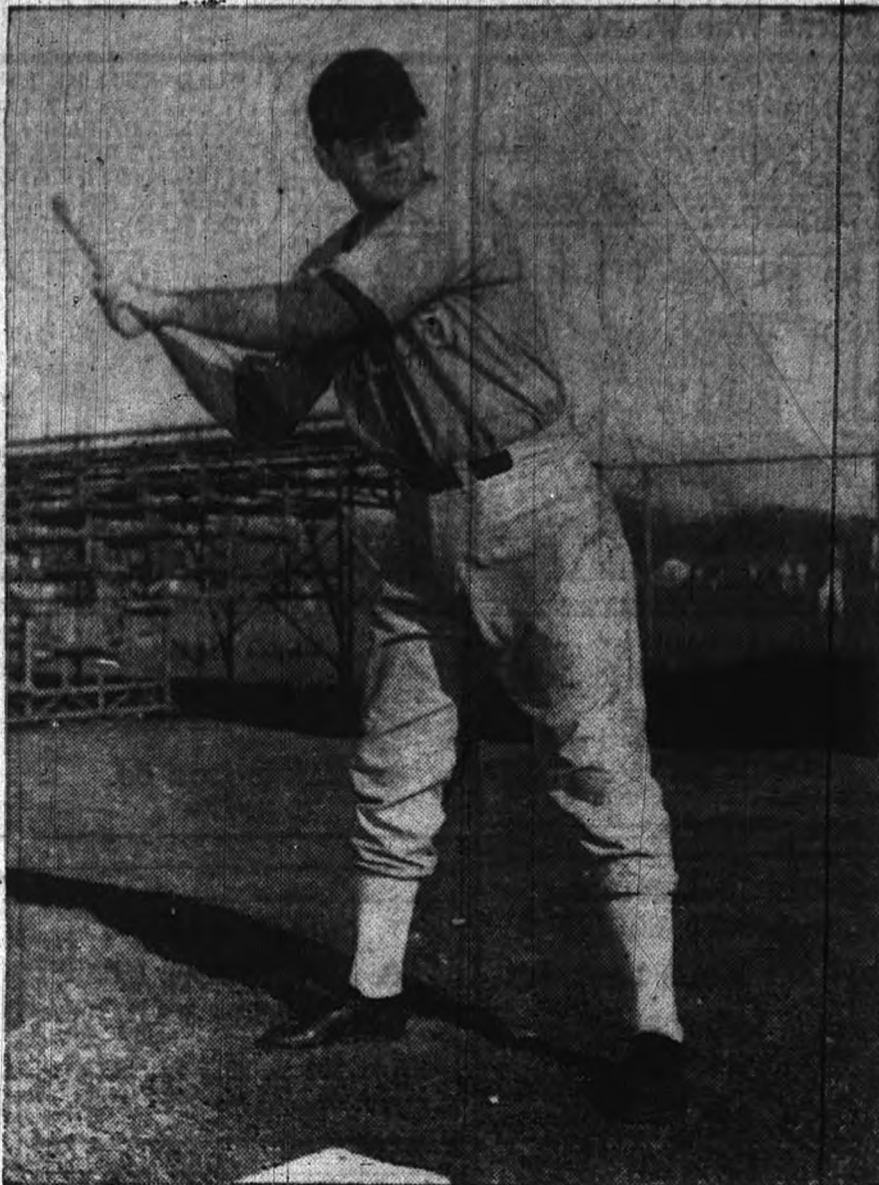

Cotton Lindloff Singles, Doubles, Homers, In Tilt

Ohio State came to College Station yesterday and went to town. The Buckeye team pounded an impotent Aggie nine into a 12-4 defeat on Kyle Field yesterday afternoon in the first of a three game series. As far as the Aggies were concerned the ever threatening rain should have started and never let up.

Not until Cotton Lindloff poked one of the pitches of Buckeye Pete Perini in the sixth for a homer did the Maroon and White team manage to get a score across the plate. By that time the Ohioans had eleven runs and the game had away.

Pete Perini held the Farmers in the palm of his hand until the round tripper was hit by Lindloff. Perini allowed the Aggies to get four hits until he was relieved after the first half of the seventh inning.

Bruce Morisse, evidently jinxed by the Star of the Week award printed in yesterday's Battalion, had to leave the mound in the second inning after walking five batters. He was relieved by Blanton Taylor for the remainder of the game.

James Campbell, the first man up in the ball game, lined a two-two pitch of Morisse's between Russ Mays on third and short stop Guy Wallace for the first hit of the day. Ray Gebhart, the second man to step to the plate, laved a single in the same spot, advancing Campbell to second.

After Weygant sacrificed the runners to third and second with one out, and cleanup batter Norb Ranz walked, Alex Verdova slammed a fly into short center field, Campbell scoring from third on the throw-in.

That ended the scoring for the first inning, but the Buck-

eyes opened the throttle all the way in the second and pushed five runs over the plate. Carlton Parrill walked to open the second stanza, and advanced to third on a wild pitch that got away from catcher Bob Graham.

From that point the Buckeyes proceeded to tear the Aggies apart, waiting Morisse out either walks or pitches right down the groove. One of the few bright things about this inning as far as the Cadets were concerned was the beautiful play made by Russ Mays to double Campbell off at second.

In the fifth inning the Ohio team pushed five more runs across the plate. Alex Verdova started the inning with a single and finished it by flying out. Perini homered with full bases for four runs.

Cotton Lindloff's round tripper was matched with a score in the eighth.

A&M scored in the eighth inning after Albert Hasselo replaced Perini. (See OHIO STATE, Page 4)

Trackmen Set Relay Tryouts

Aggies versus Aggies will be the order of the day Saturday when the Maroon cinder artists compete against each other beginning at 3:30 for places on some eleven relay teams. The relay teams are to run in the Texas Relays in Austin on Friday and Saturday of next week.

Personnel for several of the teams has already been decided upon, but other positions are wide open at the present. An all out race between varsity half milers this Saturday will determine the four 880 men who will make up the Aggie two mile entry for Austin. One of the 880 runners will carry the baton on the second lap of the distance medley.

The distance medley quartet should be one of the strongest A&M entries with Benton Terry taking the first 440 leg, probably Carrol Hahn holding down the 880 section, Julian Herring running the three-quarter mile

sprint, and J. D. Hampton handling the anchor position for a mile. With the Texas Relays scheduled for two days this year the distance runners will be able to turn in top performances in both the distance medley on Friday and the four mile relay on Saturday.

Last year the A&M four mile relay of Webster Stone, Hahn, Joe McGlothlin, and Hampton won the event at Austin and then repeated in the Kansas Relays before finishing fifth in the Drake Relays. This spring's team will include Hampton and Hahn with the sophomore miler, Herring, and dependable Jerry Bonnen filling out the foursome.

Aggie hopes in the sprint (440) relay will ride with W. D. Richardson, Bob Hall, Red Wilson, and Bill Napier. This same combination, with possibly Don Cardon replacing Richardson, will enter the half mile (880) relay. A&M's

sprint combinations have been finishing a strong second to the national championship claimants of TU since the first meet in 1948. No entry from the local campus will be made in the sprint medley. The Maroon mythical national (Continued on Page 4)
