

College Women's Social Club Exhibits Treasures

Treasures from Around the World were exhibited Friday afternoon by members of the College Women's Social Club at a meeting held in Spina Hall on the Campus.

Many countries were represented in the "treasures", among them England, Sweden, Germany, Italy, Russia, Egypt, The Holy Land, Arabia, Puerto Rico, China, Japan, India, Pakistan, Paraguay, Panama, Hawaii, and Greece.

The treasures ranged from Chinese jade jewels to a handwoven Chinese Indian sash depicting an alligator hunt in Paraguay. Among the Swedish collection of Mrs. J. W. Potts were handwoven Swedish linens, an early eighteenth century Swedish watch, and a Swedish sailor's knife. Mrs. J. T. Schmidt's Meissen porcelain from Dresden attracted attention as did the exhibit of articles from Palestine displayed by Mrs. Louis Hanna, formerly a missionary in the Holy Land.

Mrs. J. T. L. McNew showed a Chinese collection among which were a teak table, satinwood and ebony elephant bookends, and two biras made from water buffalo horns. Mrs. W. S. Allen also displayed numerous treasures from China, a jade set of necklaces, ear rings, bracelets and rings, Chinese wall hangings, a carved cork picture, and a silver tea urn.

Silver necklaces and bracelets from India as well as two Chinese Mandarin coats were several of the treasures contributed by Mrs. Ide Trotter. Mrs. H. E. Burgess exhibited a large silver Chinese jardiniere and a copper Russian snover. Delicate handmade spiderweb lace and Chaco Indian surtees from Paraguay were shown by Mrs. W. H. Delaplaine. Interesting articles from Puerto Rico were exhibited by Mrs. George Potter. A hand carved Tyrolean boy who really whistled when wound up was brought by Mrs. Gibb Gilchrist. These are only a few of the many intriguing items contributed.

To complement the displays a style show was given at which original costumes from foreign countries were modeled and explained by the models. Mrs. F. L. Thomas, Jr. wore a hula kuu, an adult dress, with a train, for all occasions in Hawaii. Little Barbara Jean Thomas was dressed in the well known hula grass-skirt complete with bracelets and leis, the traditional costume for children. The Hawaiian clothes were loaned by Mrs. J. H. Quisenberry.

Mrs. D. W. Williams appeared in a black Japanese ceremonial gown brought back recently by Dr. Ide Trotter. Dress-up shop sticks adorned her coiffure. Mrs. J. E. Roberts and Mrs. J. T. L. McNew wore Chinese mandarin coats also brought by Dr. Trotter. Mrs. A. E. Salls modeled an

Egyptian man's costume while Mrs. A. N. McDowell wore the garb of a man from Pakistan. Mr. Heibe, a graduate student from Egypt, donned the costume given to Chancellor Gibb Gilchrist by the Crown Prince of Arabia on the occasion of his visit to A&M.

Mrs. J. W. Potts wore a Swedish costume representing the Swedish prince of Smaland made for her by the Swedish 4-H Club girls. A Palestinian handmade costume from the city of Nazareth was worn by Mrs. C. W. Crawford. This costume belongs to Mrs. Louis Hanna. A gray silk embroidered Italian shawl adorned the shoulders of Mrs. Henderson Shufeldt. Representing Paraguay came Mrs. W. H. Delaplaine clad in a handwoven and hand embroidered dress ornamented with Indian ceremonial bracelets and necklace of orange miniature straw hats. Mrs. J. S. Mogford made her appearance in a pollera, a festal costume of Panama, completely covered with handmade lace and embroidery. Representing a Greek peasant dressed for a Delphian feast day at which a young girl hopes to meet her future husband was Mrs. Ide Trotter.

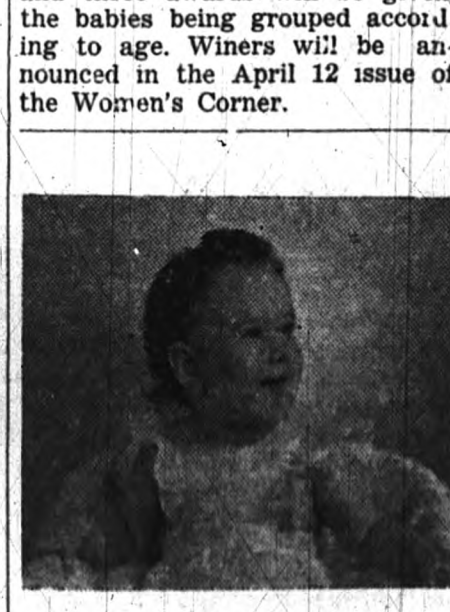
Deadline Is Set For Baby Entries
