The second story dance floor in the new Student Memorial Center is already being poured, and next week K. R. Simmons, the general superintendent, hopes to pour the roof on the west end where the hotel will be located.

Already one can see piles of Austin Shell Stone, a limestone with many sea shells imhedded in it, which will be used as the outer covering for the first floor. The stacks of yellow bricks are to be used for the facings of the

to be used for the facings of the upper floors.

Actually, three buildings will be constructed, although they will be connected so that the hotel in the west will look as if it is the same building as the main student center, and the game building behind and east of the main center, where pool tables and bowling alleys will be located, will be connected by a

In the main center there will be a kitchen, coffee shop, dining room, PX, post office, fountain room, general lounge, three meeting rooms, and the outdoor dancing terrace will be on the second floor. The twelve chair barber shop and mechanical service rooms will be in the basement.

The hotel will have meeting rooms, a card room, the Student Senate chamber, a music room, and a general office. Thirty-four regular hotel rooms will be located in both the second and third floors. Each room will have its own bath.

Three elevators will be in the hotel and student center besides a dumb waiter for use by the waiters in bringing up food to the second floor from the kitchen.
