Last December Michigan decided to find out if its teachers were really good teachers. In January, 1948, A&M conducted a survey to discover the same thingif our teachers are really good teachers. Copeland's room-mate, Dick Joseph, revealed the circumstances leading up to the burns.



a request by the college authorities asking that the useless "culture courses" be rendered unauthorized. (ugh!) courses don't






