The Cadets won all the doubles matches, but lost one singles match.

In the singles matches played, Rodney Sellars, number one player for the Aggies, defeated ACC's number one netter, Harry Tansil, 6-3, 6-8, 6-1; Allan Aaronson of the Ags trounced Rafa Franco, 6-2, 6-0; Price Metcalfe of A&M stomped Rudy Wyatt, 6-0, 6-1; Charlie Hodge defeated Bill Montgomery of ACC, 6-2, 5-7, 7-5; Jim-

my Gray dumped Russell Coffee of the Wildcats, 6-2, 6-3; and Bill Hoover of the Aggies lost to Freddie Waddell, 2-6, 8-10.

In making a clean sweep of the doubles matches Metcalfe and Gray dropped Franco and Coffee, 6-1, 6-0; Aaronson and Sellars defeated Tansil and Waddell, 6-2, 6-4; and Metcalfe and Hodge beat Montgomery and Wyatt, 6-3, 6-2.

Aggies And Bears To Clash Here Thursday

Fish Netters Beat Shorthorns, 4-3

A&M's Fish tennis team defeated the Shorthorns' tennis team from TU four points to three in a series of matches held here yesterday.

Royce Tate of the Fish was the pacemaker of the tournament winning his singles match against Bill Bonham, 6-3, 6-3, and teaming with R. G. DeBerry to drop Julian Oates and Bernard Gerhardt in the final and crucial match of the meet, 7-5, 7-8, 6-4.

In the other matches played Bernard Gerhardt of the Yearlings defeated Bobby Duncan, 6-4, 6-3; Aaron Cohen of the Fish lost to Charlie Bludworth, 7-9, 6-1, 8-6; Duncan and Cohen outplayed and defeated Bludworth and Bonham, in the number two doubles match, 7-5, 8-6, 6-0.

In the big singles match of the day, Oates defeated DeBerry in a close match which is not indicated by the score. The match was played in the DeWare Field House. Oates' big-bertha serve was the determining factor in this match, since the hardwood floor made Oates' serve bounce higher and faster than it would have had on clay.

The final doubles match, also played in the field house, proved to be the most interesting to the spectators. The entire match was filled with spectacular serving and net play, especially by Tate. Tate lost his serve only once in the entire tournament; this being in the second game of the doubles match.

The Fish trailed by two games in the third set, but they finally broke Gerhardt's serve and won DeBerry's to tie the score. In the latter part of the set with the score tied at four all and Oates serving, the Cadets broke the Shorthorn's serve to take the lead by one game. Tate's terrific service brought the Fish the match and the meet, 4-3.

Thursday afternoon will find the Aggies and the Baylor Bears slugging it out to see who remains in the spot for a chance of beating favored Texas for the 1949 Southwest Conference baseball race.

Baylor has lost two conference games thus far, losing one to the Aggies and another to the Longhorns. The Aggies have lost only one game and that was at the hands of the hard hitting bears from Waco.

Both games between the Bears and the Aggies has resulted into a slugging affair with the Bears winning the first one 13-2 and the Aggies taking the second game 15-11 after scoring 13 runs in the first three innings.

Recovering quickly from the setback by the Waco lads the Fish baseballers, playing with a strong west wind and drizzling rain setback, for the second time this season, defeated the Rice Owlets by a score of 4-1.

Inhibiting starting form for the Aggies on the mound, Bob Tankersley set the Rice baseballers down with three hits. The young right hander from San Antonio was nev-

er in serious trouble an except for the homer hit in the sixth, that should have been nothing more than a triple but was stretched in to a home run because of an out-field turf that looked like the Black Hills of South Dakota, he would have blanked the Houston squad.
