At the Exchange Store he quickly made friends with Mrs. Jahn who gave him an Aggie T-Shirt.

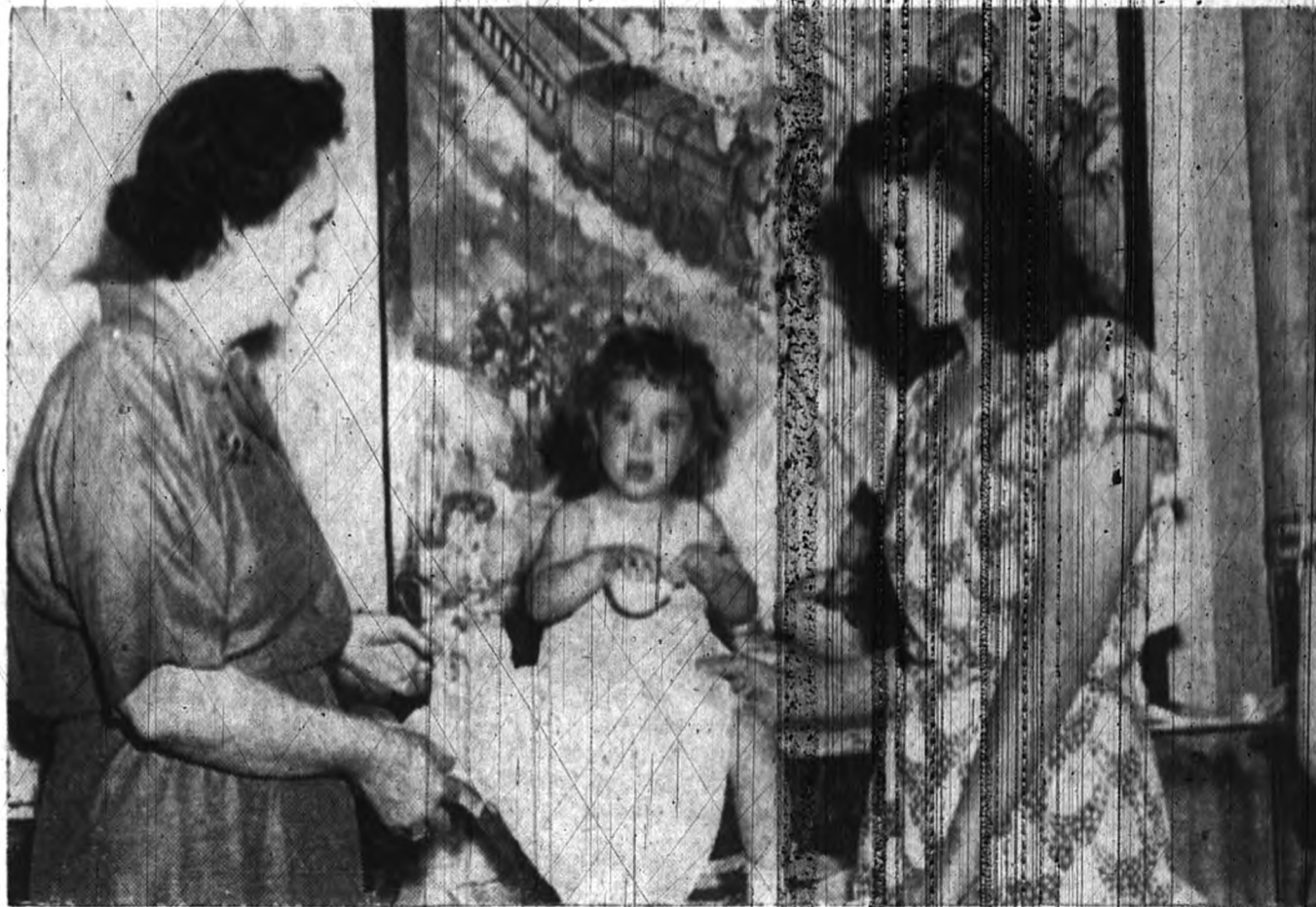
