Bernadotte Slaying Is As Yet Unsolved

LAKE SUCCESS, May 5 -(A) Israel formally reported to the United Nations today it had falled to solve the slaying of Counte Folke Bernadotte, U. N. mediator, who was killed in Jerusalem last September.
