



College Aid Bill Defeated By House Tie Vote

AUSTIN, Tex., May 13 (AP)—House penny-pinchers yesterday defeated by tie vote an amendment which would have added \$246,000 to the \$8 million dollar bill providing funds for state-supported colleges the next two years.

The vote was 62-62 on a proposal by Rep. Arthur E. Gromatzky of Priddy to increase the appropriation for the Texas A&M College Extension Service from \$539,000 to \$662,000 a year.

The votes defeated amendments to bills.

Debate of the big money bill began Thursday.

Rep. James K. Prenal of College Station asked for a \$100,000 a year increase in extension service salaries and \$23,000 more per year for maintenance, equipment and travel.

"We have lost a number of county agents—both white and colored—the past few years because salaries are too low," Prenal said.

Rep. Preston Smith of Lubbock, chairman of the subcommittee that wrote the higher education bill, said it represented an increase of 15 per cent over funds appropriated by the legislature two years ago.

"We tried to stay with the fifteen per cent increase down the line. If we don't, this (amendment) will break the dam . . . and open the gates to a flood of amendments to increase other appropriations," he warned.

The House recessed until 2:30 p.m.
