Backtracking the war is too big a job for any one person. It was a long war in a wide world, and no man saw it all.

Can I help peel off some of the past for you? What shall I tell the girls in Piccadilly circus? Is there someone you want me to look up for you in the cemetery that looks down on Omaha Beach? They say there isn't a red stain on the sands there now, and once there were so many. And a man lying on every stain.
It's June again in the Normandy hedgerows, soldier. Five years don't make much difference to hedgerows. But how the world has changed for the men who fired across them at each other in 1944! How odd it will be to see live cows grazing in the fields outside St. Lo. Remember, soldier, how it

seemed like every cow you saw was dead? And they lay in the shell-pitted pastures with their stiff legs stuck in the aid like bloated toy rubber balloons.
The road into St. Lo winds past a calvados factory. It's probably repaired by now. I'll toast you in raw calvados, brother, and you remember that stuff. One drink, one day off your life.

And then, of course, comes Paris, the glory foxhole of all time. The day we went in there the town went crazy, and no Yank could spend a dollar. Bet you can now, hey soldier?

Then we're going on to Frankfurt and Berlin, where they are putting brick back on brick again and talking of "the new Germany."

Civil Service Announces Exams

Examinations for engineering positions in Washington, D. C. and vicinity and a few positions in mobile field units throughout the country have been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission. Salaries range from \$2152 to \$3727 per year. Persons appointed to engineering aid positions will perform subprofessional engineering work in one of the branches of engineering such as civil, electrical, mechanical, etc.

No written tests are required; applicants must have had from 3 months to 5 years of engineering experience, part of which, for position at the higher salary levels, must have been in a specialized branch of engineering. Appropriate study may be substituted for all or part of the required experience, depending upon the level of the position.

Further information and application forms may be obtained from most post offices or regional Civil Service offices. Applications will be accepted in the Commission's Washington office until June 30.

Total new cases reported through June 4 were 37 compared with 72 the previous week, said Dr. George W. Cook, State Health Officer.
