WASHINGTON, June 15.—A new Treasury list shows America's bestpaid corporation employee in 1947 (or fiscal year) spilling over into 1948) got \$810,000—\$175,200 less than he got to be No. 1 the previous year also. 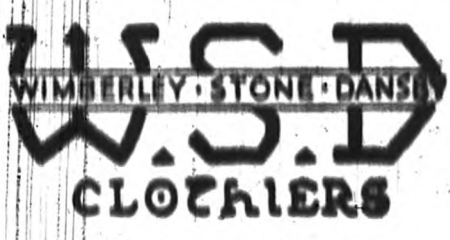

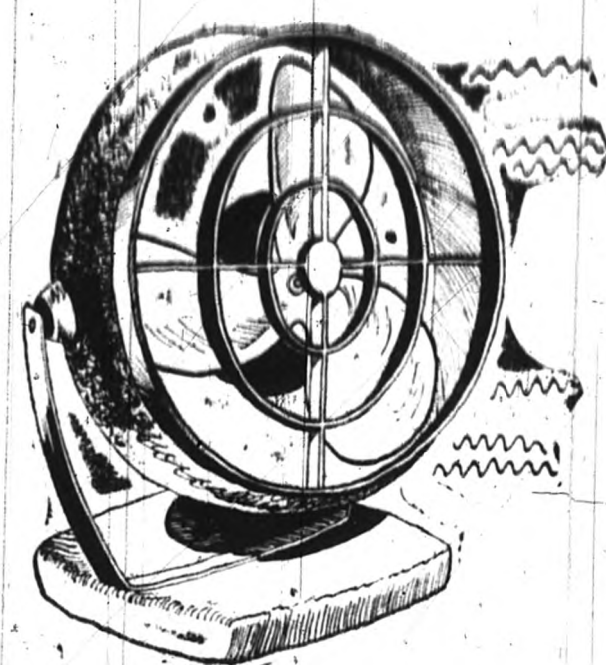

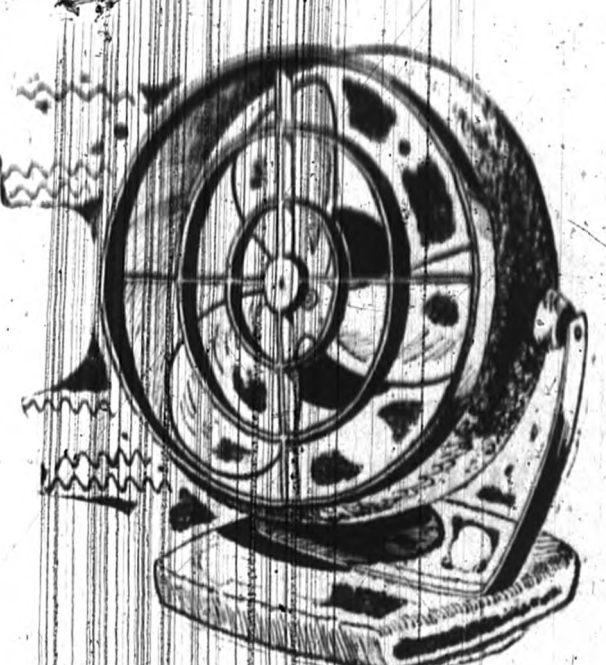
