

Bad Holes Too

A 10 In 1930 Texas Open Taught Nelson A Lesson

NEW YORK—The inconsistent golfer has little difficulty remembering his pars or birdies. By the same token the pro golfer can rattle off in a minute or less his worst holes.

Take Bryon Nelson, for example. In 1945 the Fort Worth, Tex., star set a record for tournament golf when he won \$52,511. In 1939 he won the United States Open. Yet

I was playing in front of Gene Sarazen and was leading him at the time. I thought I was a real hot shot in golf.

"I thought I had this particular tournament sewed up. Well, the San Antonio river runs right through the fairway at the 15th. I hit a shot in the water. Then I drove two more balls in the water and finally came up with a 10.

"Gene had a four on the hole and finished with a 71 and won the tournament. I finished in '78.

"From then on it taught me to tend to my own business and not worry about the other fellow.

As a pro, Nelson recalls an eight he shot on the par five eleventh hole during 1944 at the Beverly Country Club in Chicago.

"There were woods on the left of the fairway and I hooked several drives into the woods. I came up with an eight.

...nine years earlier, as an amateur he shot a 10 in the Texas Open at the Brackenridge Park Country Club at San Antonio.

"It was during the first round of play," recalls Nelson. "It happened on the 15th hole at Brackenridge during the Texas Open.

All-Time High of 864 Schools In '49 Interscholastic League

Dallas, July 26—(AP)—Two facts are notable in the 1949 lineup of the Texas Interscholastic League football: 1. The largest field in history awaits the referee's whistle.

2. Class AA has been returned to the 16-District plan.

In the tentative list of participating schools (which usually goes unchanged on Sept. 15—the last day for entering), there are 864 schools. That's the all-time high.

The increase over last year, when there were 840 schools, is in Class B and Six-Man football. Class B has jumped from 324 to 339 and Six-Man—the largest for any state in the nation—is 187 compared to 178 last year.

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Coaches Say There Was No Black Baling Of SW Officials

As a result of a secret meeting of coaches in Dallas nearly five months ago, some of the oldest football officials in Texas will not appear in any Southwest Conference games this year.

The hush-hush session in the Adolphus Hotel on Sunday, March 6, saw the head coaches of the seven Southwest Conference member schools put into effect a black ball system that drastically reduced the list of officials eligible for work in their games.

Only one negative vote was required to keep an official out of all conference games this year.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram released the first story Monday on the meeting.

When James H. Stewart, Executive secretary of the conference, makes public his assignment of officials for games of the 1949 season, such well known names as Harry Viner, Charles Swartz, Earl Dayvault, Gene Bedford, Charles Hawn and O. N. Yearly, are expected to be missing. With them there will be dozens of others that are less known in the conference.

Minimizes Report
Stewart minimized the report in an interview at New Castle, N. H., where he is attending a meeting of the National Association of Collegiate Commissioners. He said that any names not on the 1949 list "were the result of a consolidation rather than any possible wrong doings."

Stewart said that the usual conference procedure had not been followed in allowing the coaches to submit individual "preferential lists" of officials to work their games.

Instead, he said, this year the coaches met and made one master list. "As a result," Stewart said, "some members were eliminated."

Jess Neely, Head Coach at Rice, was the most revealing as to what went on in the meeting. Neely said the meeting was to seek a better way of selecting officials.

Take Pressure Off
"We tried to think up a way to take the pressure off the officials who might think they owed a coach a favor just because that coach named him on his preferential list," Neely said.

"So we got together and named some 40 officials who were the unanimous choice of the seven coaches. They are the men who will work conference games. They needn't work about the coaches any more. They are working for the conference and not any one coach can black ball an official."

"If one coach thinks an official is incompetent he can bring up the

Legion Baseball Play-offs to Be Held in Bryan

All plans have been completed for the staging of the state American Legion Junior Boys Baseball Tournament in Bryan next week. The tournament will be run off August 2, 3, 4 and 5.

The four teams which will compete for the state crown are being determined this week in play-offs around the state. Lubbock is playing Odessa, Waxahachie is contesting Dallas Sunset, Bryan is playing Galveston and Austin is playing with Laredo.

There will be double-headers on August 2 and 3 starting at 6:30 and 8:15 p. m. with single games set for August 4 and 5. The winner will represent Texas in the regional tournament at Little Rock, Ark.

A downtown parade and barbecue picnics are among events planned for the opening day of the tourney.

The four teams that will come will be survivors of 157 teams which started play on June 10. Austin's Buddies won the 1948 crown.

The local Bryan post (Earl Graham Post 159) is sponsoring the state meet here.
