

Ends to be Strongest Positions on '49 Line

End Coach J. T. King will have 15 men from which to man the two terminal positions on the Aggie line this fall.

With returning lettermen such as Andy Hillhouse, Wray Whittaker, Cedrick Copeland and Dick Callender, to build around, it appears that the end slots on the Aggie eleven this fall will be the strongest on the line.

Besides the four lettermen who will be back, King will have such outstanding sophomores as Jaro Netardus, Carl Hill, and Jerry Crossman gunning for the positions.

Missed most by King will be Charlie Wright, who was second in the conference last year in pass receptions.

Andy Hillhouse, a 225 pound junior from Alvin, is one of the Aggie's outstanding prospects for all-American honors this year. He made honorable mention on the United Press' all-American squad last season, although he was only a substitute end during the early part of the year.

Standing six feet, three inches high at right end, he will be the biggest end in the Southwest Conference this year.

Fully recovered from a broken jaw that sidelined him last year after the SMU game, senior Wray Whittaker is expected to take over the starting assignment at the left end position. Weighing 195 and standing six feet, two inches tall, Whittaker was outstanding in his playing until he was sidelined last fall.

inch, 175 pound junior from Waco, is expected to see a lot of service at an end position this fall. He was one of the smallest linemen who played in the Southwest Conference last year.

Dick Callender, a 170 pound end from College Station, will see a lot of service as a defensive man this fall. He's noted for his rough, bang-up defensive tactics.

Netardus, Hill and Crossman were the freshmen in spring training who showed the most promise in the end positions.

Netardus, a 195 pounder from El Campo, was one of the outstanding performers on the Fish team last fall. Six feet tall, he will probably see a lot of offensive action.

Crossman was changed from fullback to end in spring drills because he showed so much promise at that position. He played fullback on the Fish team last fall. A 195 pound six footer, he sparkled as a pass receiver in the spring intra-squad games.

Hill was ineligible last season but showed up well in spring training. A 175 pounder from Denison, he will play some on offense this fall.

Also available for service at the terminal positions will be Dorban Barton, a junior from Fort Stockton, Charles Davidson, a junior from Port Arthur, Dan Spears, a junior from Belton, and Don Nicholas, a senior from San Angelo.

Sophs expected to see some service are Clinton Guinn from Shreveport, La., Charles Hodge from Dallas, Jack Jones from Breckenridge, and Edsel Jones from College Station.

Height is very much in evidence at the end positions this year. Only three men, Dick Callender, Cedrick Copeland, and Carl Hill measure under six feet, and they all stand five-eleven.

Four others, Dorban Barton, Charles Davidson, Clinton Guinn, and Andy Hillhouse stand six-three. The rest of the candidates are in between these measurements.

At the inner positions on the line this fall rest the troubles which will cause Line Coach Bill DuBose no little amount of worry. The center position, which will be filled by capable men like Jimmy Flowers and Bob Bates, will perplex DuBose the least. Gone is starter Hub Ellis from last year's team but Flowers, an all-state center at Highland Park in 1945, is expected to take over and handle the position capably.

Moved from tackle where he played last year, the 212 pound Flowers is expected to make the center position the strongest that it has been in a long while.

Right behind and expected to share a lot of the pivot position duties will Flowers is Bob Bates, a 208 pound junior from Fort Worth. He and Flowers are two of the better linebackers on the

squad this year and may see a lot of action together at those positions on defense.

Also slated to see duty at the center position are Hugh Meyer, one of the more outstanding sophomores in spring drills, and Jim Fowler, Pat Diffie, Hulin Smith, and Van Hetherly.

DuBose could aptly name the guard and tackle slots the "head-ache" positions of the line. Gone are such performers as tackle Marion Settegast, all-conference tackle Jim Winkler and all-conference guard Odell Stautzenberger.

Three lettermen guards, Max Greiner, Carl Molberg and Mickey Spencer are returning but the positions will be shallow in capable replacements.

Greiner is expected to be given the nod as the starting left guard. A 190 pound junior from Houston, he played a lot at the position last year and is expected to see much service there again.

Molberg, a 195 pound junior from Fredericksburg, will relieve him a lot at the position.

Elo Nohavitzka, a starting guard on last year's Fish team and one of its outstanding performers, looked good at the position in spring training.

At the right guard slot, Spencer is expected to start. A 205 pound junior from Pasadena, he will alternate in the position with Jim Dugas and Will Rush, both 200 pounders from Port Arthur and Lampasas, respectively.

To bolster the guard positions, DuBose has sophs Bud Davidson, Ralph Dresser, Eddie Holley, and Denny Hutson to fill in when necessary.

Dwayne Tucker and Tuck Chapin are the two returning lettermen at the tackle slots. Because of inexperience, these positions are expected to be the weakest on the line this fall.

Chapin, a 215 pound junior from San Antonio, saw some service at tackle last fall but not enough to get experience necessary for the position.

Tucker, a 210 pounder from Waco, will probably start at right tackle. Like Chapin, inexperience is his biggest drawback.

Sam Moses and Percy Burk are also slated to see some service in the left tackle slot.

Moses, a starting tackle on last year's freshman team, is big enough—220 pounds. He might come along fast enough to make the position before the season is over.

Burk, who weighs 205, is a senior whose squad experience will rate him a chance to see a lot of service.

Russ Hudek and Alex Stroble, both sophomores, will see some service at the right tackle position.

Hudek, the heaviest member of the Aggie squad this fall, weighs 220 pounds, and accord-

College Station Swimmers Win Junior Olympic Swim Meet

College Station's swimming team, coached by Aggie swimming coach Art Adams and sponsored by the College Station Recreation Council, won five first places and placed six other times in 12 events Thursday in the Shamrock Hotel pool in Houston to win the McCarthy Junior Olympics team title by eight points.

The College Station team compiled 113 points in the two-day meet. Golfcrest of Houston was second with 105 points. Oklahoma City's seven-member team had 71; Tyler, 43; New Orleans, 36; Houston Y, 29; and Nacogdoches, 22.

Bill Karow chalked up his second and third first places Thursday in the 50-meter free style and the 100-meter breast stroke events to play a big part in College Station's victory. He won the 150-meter individual medley in the boys' 17 and under division Wednesday.

Golfcrest again had at least one place in nearly every event Thursday, but couldn't hold off the College Station crew and their valuable points in the relays.
