Tidwell then made a first on the Ag 33 with an end run. After two ground plays and a pass attempt, Larry punted to Dunn on his 25 who returned it one yard.

Villanova then made two more first downs before the gun sound ending the game.

**Texas Agricultural Writers Conference Here September 30**

Agricultural writers of Texas papers, including dailies, weeklies, and radio stations, will gather here September 30 and October 1, for the annual Agricultural Writers Conference.

Reports on the trends of the program for the coming year, research teaching, extension activities of the System, and a general overall picture of the various departments, will be presented.

A highlight of the conference will be a forum conducted by the newspapermen, to hear reports from the various sections of the state on the conditions of their areas and their needs from an agricultural standpoint. Top A&M men will be on hand to answer questions as to what the System can do to aid them in their problems.

A tour of the college agricultural centers will acquaint the writers with the latest in research work and progress that is being made.

Several agricultural leaders of the state have been invited to take part in the program. Men of The College and the System scheduled to deliver talks and take part in the discussions, include Gibb Gilchrist, chancellor of the A&M System; F. C. Bolton, president of The College; E. R. Alexander, head of the Agricultural Education Department and D. W. Williams, vice-chancellor, who is in Germany for a 10-day stay at the request of the State Department, to advise with them on the agricultural program in that country.

**'27 Grad Heads Stock Show**

R. B. Tate, Bexar County Agricultural agent and A&M graduate of 1927, has been named superintendent of livestock for the San Antonio Livestock Exposition's first show to be held next February at the Coliseum.

The appointment was announced by Perry Shankle, Exposition president.

Tate has had more than 20 years' experience in the agricultural and livestock field. He was one of the organizers of the Midwest Texas Livestock Show and Exposition at Sweetwater and served as its manager until the event was discontinued during the war. He also was a judge of fat steers at the 1944 Fort Worth Livestock Exposition and at the Pan-American Hereford Show at Dallas in 1945.

A native of Llano County, Tate taught vocational agriculture at Llano High School for two years following his graduation until 1929 when he was appointed county agent at Mason, where he inaugurated an extensive 4-H Club livestock feeding program.

He served as county agent at Sweetwater from 1936 until World War II, and was discharged in 1946 with the rank of major. After serving temporarily as county agent of Milan County, he came to San Antonio in March, 1946, as county agent in San Antonio.

**Hunters Asked For Doves Right Wings**

An appeal is being made to Texas hunters to send mourning dove wings to the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Unit, Texas A&M College, College Station.

From these wings it is possible for wildlife technicians to determine how many of the birds were hatched this past summer, and thereby know if a successful nesting season occurred.

Collecting dove wings at A&M is a part of a coordinated research program initiated by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service due to a noticeable decline in the dove population during the past few years. All wildlife conservation agencies in the Central and South-eastern United States are cooperating in this program.

Hunters are urged to aid in this program by sending the right wing of doves to the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Unit, A&M College, College Station. Each wing should be marked with the date and location where each dove was taken.
