Iowa State, Missouri Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma A&M earned the O U eleven the fifth spot nationally in the final Associated Press poll.

The Big Seven champions did not step here, however, but went on to further fame in a contest with North Carolina ir the Sugar Bowl. A 14-6 triumph over the Charley Justice-led Tarheels resulted from this meeting of nationally - ranked power-

Oklahoma has already taken one scalp this fall. Last weekend the red and white clad team trounced highly regarded Boston College by a 46-0 whitewash score. The Eagles had been expected to make a close game of it, but the OU backfield of quarterback Darrell Royal, halfbacks George Thomas and Lindell Pearson, and fullback Leon Heath was too potent behind the hard-hitting Sooner line.

Although the Aggies looked much better in dropping the Texas Tech Red Raiders 26-7 in San Antonio than they had the previous week against Villatiova, Oklahoma will probably enter the game at

> As mentioned before, the Sooners have an outstanding backfield in Royal, Thomas, Pearson, and Heath, Royal, a three-letterman, is taking over the shoes of the great Jack Mitchell. Previously he had been a halfback, even though last year he started at quarter against the Aggies with Mitchell at a halfback slot. Necessity, in the form of greater skill on the part of Mitchell, resulted in the

> Royal is a 160-pounder who can pass, run, and handle the ball with the best of the cur-rent crop of backs and will probably be equal to his task if not quite the magician that his predicessor was.

Thomas was all-Big Seven last year when he gained 845 yards and scored ten touchdowns. The 177-pound half has an even larger running mate in Pearson, who tops 190 pounds. Pearson ranked right with Thomas as a runner last fall as he picked up the neat total of 558 yards rushing and scored seven sixpointers.

Heath has been compared to the remarkable Joe Golding, leading Big Seven rusher while a plunging fullback on the '46 Sooner team that almost toppled Blanchard and

America's current Number least a three touchdown fa- Davis-sparked Army. Heath packs 192 hard pounds of muscle on his jarring frame and will give any opponent plenty of headaches.

> Although all - conference tackle Homer Paine is gone, he is not expected to be missed too much. Wade Walker, injured last fall, is back at his physical best and is being boomed for All-America as one of the nation's top blocking linemen. At the other tackle slot Leon Manley adds his 202 pounds to the convincing statement of top linemen advanced by the 197pound Walker.

Guards Stan West, 229 pounds, and Norman McNabb, 183 pounds, are slated to man the center-flanking positions. Both are sturdy veterans of the grid wars and West has been receiving almost as much acclaim as Walker in the preseason all-star talk. Charley Dowell, number two center last year, moves into the starting position to handle the offensive chores.

Just as the guard and tackle positions offer All-American prospects, so do the end spots afford authorities—and opponents - speculation on just how much top material Oklahoma has garnered the past few years. The fairhaired lad at end is Jim Owens, a 195-pound dervish, with his teammate at the other terminal, 166-pound Bobby Goad, close behind in observers' regard.

Besides the first string strength the Big Red offers, Coach Wilkinson is plenty deep in veteran reserves. All this adds up to the apparent conclusion — lookout Aggies, you're playing with DYNA-
