Making his second selection for Lineman of the Week, The Battalion Sports Staff has picked guard Max Greiner for the nomination this week.

For playing such heads-up football as this, the Sports Staff definitely feels that the selection as Lineman of the Week should go to Greiner without qualifications.

Ags Doing OK SWC Statistics For Week Show

A&M football players kept their averages up in all the statistics departments while being defeated by the Oklahoma Sooners last Saturday, according to statistics released yesterday by the Southwest Conference secretary, James Stewart.

In the ball totting department, the Aggies' Bob Smith retained his second place position with a total of 266 yards gained from scrimmage in 48 carries. "Muscles" Campbell, Arkansas fullback, had the top spot with a total of 321 yards in 32 carries.

Bob Goff, Cadet halfback, was just barely in the ninth spot with 111 yards in 26 carries. Kyle Rote of SMU was tied with Goff in total yards but it took him 29 times so he took over the tenth spot.

An Aggie player's name appeared in the leading passers column for the first time this week. Don Nicholas, who made his '49 debut against the Sooners in the man under spot for the Cadets Saturday, is now firmly entrenched in the fifth spot among the conference's 10 top passers with a total of 156 yards made on 14 completions. Nicholas made a total of 23 attempts.

Lindy Berry still leads the conference passers with a total of 497 yards gained. Berry has attempted 74 and completed 39 tosses.

Sophomore Aggie Yale Lary dropped to fifth spot this week in the punting department. Lary now has a 35.5 yard average. He has kicked 21 times for a total of 756 yards.

Bill Hickey of TCU leads the conference punters with a 41.1 yard average for 6 boots.

John Christensen and Glenn Lippman hold down the fourth and fifth spots in the leading punt returners group.

Christensen has returned 3 punts a total of 57 yards for an average 19 yards per return. Lippman has returned two punts 28 yards for a 14 yard average.

In the pass receiving statistics, A&M also made it for the first time. Cedric Copeland caught 6 passes for a total of 67 yards to top the tenth spot in that department.

Morris Bailey of TCU leads the pass receivers with 16 passes caught for a total of 194 yards.

Fullback Bob Smith still holds down the number two spot in the scoring department. Smith has scored four TDs for 24 points.

When the Aggie Fish square off against Weatherford Junior College at 7:30 Thursday night on Kyle Field, the contest won't be just another game. Rather it will be another of the all important stones in the football fortress "we're building."

Last fall the coaching staff seemed to concentrate on landing fish footballers who were adept backfield performers. Not that we didn't boast of a number of huskies who are making their weight felt in the line right now (despite reports to the contrary from AP writer Harold Ratliff).

But this year the call went out for "little fella's" who could play tackle and guard well and weighed in at 210 or better. Well, the recruiters didn't fail to pick up some top backs along the way, but sure 'nuff, Freshman Coach Marion Pugh is sporting a pack of bruisers who should make the Fish line

one of the largest, roughest units in the conference. Because no one has seen the little Ags in hand to hand combat with other freshman aggregations, the information available on individual players is limited to those who received all-state mention last fall in their last year of school boy ball.

We might add, however that Frank Simmen summed up our feelings pretty well when he said, "We are of the opinion that all of Texas' best footballers are not all-stars."

Charles Houston O'Neal, better known in sports circles as Chuck, delayed his entry at A&M for a year but is now a member of the Fish squad. O'Neal was considered the outstanding lineman of all-state in his senior year (1947) at Corpus Christi High School. He played for the South All-Stars in the annual North-South fracas in addition to being awarded a first string tackle position on the AA all-state team.

Six linemen who made names for themselves more recently than O'Neal are also included on the roster of first year men. Right at the top of the list of prospects is Charles Saxe, 185-pound, 6' 2" end from South Park in Beaumont. Saxe was placed on the AA all-state first team last fall and played for the South All-Stars in the '49 version of the coaching game.

Another fullfledged all-stater is tackle Dick Self, Brackenridge of San Antonio gridster, who made the first team chosen from the City Conference player. Self, too, showed his skill in the August all-star classic on the South team. The former San Antonio athlete weighed 205 and stood 6' 2" at game time for the Beaumont tilt.

Another South All-Star was 225-pound, 6' 1" Bobby Dixon of Ingleside. Although Dixon did not make any of the all-state teams, the fact that he was chosen to take part in the big game at Royal Purple Stadium speaks quite well for his ability.

Big Alvin Langford played well enough for Fort Worth Poly in the fall of '48 to earn honorable mention on the City Conference all-state squad. Langford is a tackle who weighs 210 pounds.

Another City Conference man who received honorable mention on that league's all-state squad was Ralph Cox, center from Dallas' Woodrow Wilson.

Cox, his brother Jerry, and four other members of the Dallas championship Wildcats team have shifted their loyalty from Big D's top team to the Cadet eleven.

Still another tackle who won all-state honorable mention is included on the local squad. Thomas Wright of Alice is this seventh well known lineman who also made the AA selections.
