## Erratic Aggies Meet Off and On Frogs

"On again, off again" seems to be the theme songs of both the Aggies and their next opponent, TCU. The outcome of the clash in Fort supposedly left the fullback slot vacant, but 220-pound Worth Saturday afternoon probably will depend on which team is "on" — if they both are, Gus Fan is sure to see fer from his hometown junior team is "on" — if they both are, Gus Fan is sure to see one of the best games unreeled in 1949.

Aggies know only too well the unpredictableness of the Maroons, but perhaps the record of the Frogs should be scrutinized. Against not too strong Kansas in their opener, the Horned Toads took an effortless 28-0 victory.

Only the next week, after forecasters had proclaimed the Purples "sure" winners in pre-game announcements, the Oklahoma A&M Cowpokes rose up to tie the Mever men. The Okies have since continued to gain in stature despite a 7-21 loss Saturday to Mis-

Following their tie by the Pokes, the Froggies were abruptly dropped from the unbeaten ranks by Arkansas, 27-7, in the Porkers' Ozark bailiwick. Last weekend the Berry-led eleven made a minor comeback by downing Indiana, 13-6, in an intersection al contest.

Glancing at the all-time record of the A&M-TCU rivalry. one finds that the Cadets hold a healthy edge, 24 wins to 16 victories for the Frogs, while four tilts have ended in a deadlock. However, most of the Maroon wins came prior to 1925. From 1925 through 1935 the Purples prevented the Farmers from winning a single tussle, although there was a single tie (in 1937) during the period.

Since the Todd-sparked Aggies won, 18-7, in 1936, the two conference rivals have split the thirteen clashes scheduled. Each has gained six wins with the thirteenth tilt ending in a 7-7 tie. TCU took both the 1947 and 1948

Last fall the Maroons pounled the Cowtowners up and down the field for three quarters only to lose in the final period, 14-27. Goode and Goff, aided by fine blocking, blasted the hulking, but slow Purple line for 253 yards. However, a spectacular kick-off return by Berry to the A&M 33 that set up a score, and a fourth quarter agriculture. and a fourth quarter aerial attack by the same Frog that also resulted in a tally, beat the Cadets.

At quarterback is 3-letterman Lindy Berry, a 5' 10". 175-pound Wichita Falls native, won all-conference first team honors last fall and was off to a fast start for national

Pete Stout's departure had college in Compton, California. An end at the Sunshine State school, he is still flag-ging down passes well, but now he has an added attraction, blasting enemy forward

One Frog halfback is Jack Archer, a 180-pound, 6' 2" runner from Springfield, Ohio. Archer lettered last year as did two of his top running mates at the other half, Jim Hickey and Orein Browning. Ben Tompkins, a junior college transfer from Cisco, is right behind Archer. Hickey is starting at the right half spot with Browning and still another monogram winner, Johnny Dunn, breathing down his neck. Hickey weighs 173 pounds, stands 5' 11' and hails from Paris.

Bill Moorman, who has earned two letters since leavmg Odessa, plays both of-fense and defense at left end. Moorman, a 195-pound, 6' 1'.' husky, sometimes gives way to George Boals, letterman pass snatcher, when the aer-

ial attack is brewing. On the other terminal, Mor-ris Bailey, another all-conference man, holds down the ofense chores in a sensational manner. Bailey, who lives in Vernon, stands 6' 4" and weighs 195. Wayne Rogers, a two-letterman, relieves the anky end on defense. Bailey and Boals have three letters apiece.

Clarence Marable is a 60minute man at one tackle while Don Narrell, Hubert Eoff, and Roger McAuley divide time at the other post. Marable, a 220 pounder, stands 6' 21/2" and is the shortest man in the group of burly tackles. He played for Waco High before going to TCU. Narrell weighs 238, Eoff 225, and McAuley an even 200. Eoff is 6' 4'2", the other two 6' 3'2". McAuley has one letter, the others all have two.

Veteran Harold Kilman, letterman in '46 and '47, heads the list of guards. Kilman weighs 210, stands 6' 2". Fellow guards include the other starter, Morelle Hicks, Dick Lowe, and Shank Bloxom. Hicks tips the scales at 200, stands 5' 10', and sports three letters.

Top center for the Frogs is 190-pound Max Eubank, 6-ft... hatchie. Plenty of husky subs two-letterman from Waxaback up these bruisers, too!


