

Aggie ID Cards Present Problems To Visual Aid

All done and not a single camera broken. That's the report from the A&M Photographic Visual Aids Laboratory to which fell the task of taking photographs for the recently instituted Aggie ID cards.

The local photos were not so fortunate, however, when it came to processing the cards. The problem was to get a picture, plus pertinent information on the subject and inclose both in a durable celluloid wrapping through a process known as laminating.

Here, according to Visual Aids head Howard Berry is where the rub came in. It seems that the Laboratory, a non-profit organization operating solely for the benefit of the college, found a laminating press on the campus. When they tried the press they found out that it didn't produce enough heat.

The laminating process requires a temperature of 340 degrees Fahrenheit at 10,500 pounds of pressure. The group was faced with the problem of no heat, no cards, so they issued a hasty plea to a firm in New York for a new set of heating plates. Within the week the laminating process was in full swing.

As if this wasn't enough trouble they found out that the paper used was too thin, and extreme care had to be exercised in treating the cards.

All of these difficulties have been ironed out and according to Berry, the laminating job will be completed by this week.

The cards will go to the Registrar for checking, from there to the Dean of Men for recording, and then to the various outfits for distribution.

Berry reports that the majority of the pictures of the students are good. A regular identification photographic unit was used but the background was lightened and the number was lowered to lessen the "rogue's gallery" effect.

The cards will serve as positive identification for the owner and will aid him in identifying himself immediately.

It is hoped that there will be no cases reported where identification cannot be established because the picture looks too good to be the actual picture of the bearer.

Mess Committee

The mess committee election followed a statement by Charles Kirkham that all mess hall areas should be represented on the committee. Tom Calhoun, Leggett senator, suggested that married students should not be named to the mess committee since they "could not enjoy" regular mess hall privileges.

The mess committee members were also accepted by senate acclamation. They were Marvin Beck, Freshman senator; Glen Dunick, Dormitory 6; C. O. Smith, Dormitory 16; and A. G. Hulza, Dormitory 16.

Hospital committee members selected at last night's senate meeting were B. O. House, Dormitory 15; David Trent, College View; and W. E. Forsythe, day student.

Members of the publicity committee are Emmet Ingram, Walton Hall; Charles Kirkham, co-vice president of the senior class; and Floyd Henk, senator at large.

Seating Discussed

Discussion of the seating assignments at Kyle Field was begun after Walt Zimmerman, senator at large, of the executive committee read the committee's report. He said that about 10,000 seats were reserved for the student body. These would accommodate all the single students (with additional seats for 1,500 guests, and all married students and their wives).

The executive committee suggested in its report that guest seats should be allotted on a basis of 500 for the non-military students and 1,000 for the corps. This figure was arrived at when the number of married students was considered.

Charles Kirkham suggested that a compromise on distribution of the seats in the area behind the band might be worked out between corps and non-corps students for the different football games. However, Bruce Thompson pointed out the confusion that would exist with constantly shifting seating assignments.

Joe Fuller, senator from Law, then moved that the executive committee decide apportionment of seats behind the band, the end zone be reserved for students who wished to sit down during the game, and the remainder of the student area be split in two sections with the non-military in the higher portion of the stands.

This motion was defeated, 18 to 16, after Kirkham suggested that it be tabled for further consideration.

Ken Landrum, Dormitory 6, after discussion of the seating arrangements, made a motion that the corps be assigned all the area behind the band with the remainder of the student section divided as suggested in Fuller's motion. This motion carried, 19 to 14.

Power of Senate

Harry Raney, yet village, then questioned the senate's power to enforce its decision on the student body. Further discussion revealed that exclusive assignment of the area from the 30 to the 50 yard line to the corps would be very unpopular with a large number of non-military students.

Allan Eubank, together with Ken Landrum, who had made the motion for giving the cadet corps the area behind the band, then suggested that discussion on his motion, which had already passed, be re-opened.

Discussion Re-opened

The senate voted unanimously to re-consider the motion. Charles Kirkham then asked Landrum to suggest an equitable division of the area behind the band.

Landrum, after hearing discussion on the problem from various members of the senate, then suggested that the top eight rows of the area behind the band be reserved for non-military students. This would include 368 seats. The remaining seats, with the exception of the band section, would be reserved for the cadet corps.

The ratio of seats is approximately three for non-military students to four for members of the corps.

Floyd Henk, senator at large, made a motion that Landrum's suggestion be adopted and that, in addition, the area in the end zone be set aside for those students who did not wish to stand during the games be reserved for them, and that the remaining seats be assigned to corps and non-military students by the executive committee.

Non-military students will be given the top area of that section.

Committees Report

The senate also heard reports from its standing committees. Allan Eubank reported on the sweet-heart selection committee's trip to Denton, and the senate expressed whole-hearted approval of the committee's choice.

A committee to handle arrangements with the World Student Service Fund was appointed. Members were J. E. Montgomery, Miller Hall; Emmet Ingram, A. G. Hulza; Cecil Heys, Trailer Area; and E. E. Sherman, Bryan Field.

A motion by Walt Zimmerman to have minutes of each senate meeting posted on dormitory bulletin boards was approved.

Members of the election committee were put in office by acclamation of the senate. Roy Nance, Dormitory 8; Bill Moss, day student senator; Mike Mooney, Freshman senator; Charles Royalty, Hart Hall; and Jim Patterson, Annex senator; were the men named to the election committee.

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British Situation On Food Explained

E. N. Holmgreen, director of the Agriculture Foods Division of the United Kingdom, spoke to the A&M Collegiate Chapter of the Future Farmers of America at the regular meeting Monday night on "The Agricultural Situation in the British Isles."

Holmgreen graduated from A&M in 1922, and later became business manager for the college. He spent three years in Europe while in the Army and one year in Greece with the E. C. A.

In his address Holmgreen stated the United Kingdom has not produced enough food to support itself since 1880, a few scattered years excepted and that Great Britain is now the greatest import country in the world. The U. K. is now faced with the problem of changing from an industrial to a more agricultural country because of the dollar shortage. The English people must raise a large part of the agricultural products that were bought from the U. S.

He explained that the only way for Britain to renew the importation of American agriculture products on a large scale was for Americans to ask for products made in Britain. Correspondingly the dollar could be used to buy goods from America, Holmgreen said.
