Honor Society Planned Here

The Board of Directors has granted the petition of a group of members of Phi Kappa Phi, a national honor society, for the installation of an A&M chapter of the society, according to Dr. Paul J. Woods of the History Department.

Installation of the chapter will be October 31, by Dr. Frank Kern, the national president of the Society, and head of the Graduate School at Penn State. Dr. Kern is making a special trip to conduct the installation of this chapter.

At the same time, a very select group of outstanding students and faculty members will be initiated. To be eligible for membership, a student must have a grade point ratio so that it places him in the upper one-eighth of his class. This number has been cut in half for this chapter.

Extra curricular activities are also taken into consideration. Admittance is usually made in the last half of the junior year or the first semester of the senior year.

Phi Kappa Phi was founded at the University of Maine in 1897 and later formed into a national society. It is open to students in all departments of study. This is the most widely spread honor society open to all students.

Original negotiations with the society were begun last year by Dean M. T. Harrington, recently named to be the next president of A&M. Later, the job was taken over by a group of faculty members who are already members of Phi Kappa Phi and who will be charter members of the local chapter. When presented for approval, the petition was unanimously approved.

Names of the new members will be released later in the week.
