score the second Maroon touchdown against the Frogs. Recognition for the 4g end's play came in the form of his nomination for Southwestern lineman of the week for that game.

Dissatisfied in Hometown. When the Aggies journeyed to Waco to meet the Baylor Bears, Cope said he wanted nothing more than to beat the Bruins in his hometown. Although the Farmers just missed accomplishing this feat, he still played a fine game. A first quarter groin injury re-

moved him from the Razorback tilt, but he came back strong against the SMU Mustangs in Dallas the next week. Every member of the Maroon team played spectacular ball against the vaunted Ponies, and Copeland's work ranked right with that of the towering giants, Wright and Hillhouse, as the Cadets shook the Hilltop dreamboat. Like it was a chip on a turbulent mountain stream.

The futile battle waged with the Rice Owls on a quagmire-like Kyle Field was definitely not conducive to passing, but Cope played his usual dependable game on defense. In the season finale against Texas, the Waco end joined his

teammates in snaring a number of Eaty and Cashion aerials as the Cadets hammered back in a second half attack to tie the Longhorns.

During the past summer Cope continued his studies toward a physical education degree; he plans to work on a masters after receiving a bachelors degree in January, 1951.

Despite the fact that many persons failed to realize that he would take over a regular berth on the offensive unit of Coach Harry Stiteler's Farmer team this fall, Copeland opened at the right end position in the Villanova game and has held it ever since. However, against TCU last Saturday Rodney East started at the offensive right terminal since Cope was needed on defense.

As the weather cools the 176-pound ex-Tiger will probably see more and more service on both offense and defense. At least one qualified sports observer who should know Aggie football quite well has remarked that Copeland is the top Maroon end on both offense and defense. At any rate, he has shown that he is capable of crisp blocking, heady defensive play, and first class pass receiving.

If the 23-year-old Wacoan shows the improvement over his '48 play that can be expected from him, he should definitely live up to the estimates of football observers who last year rated him as one of the three top sophomore ends in the Southwest Conference.
