

Smith Regains Top Spot In SWC As Leading Rusher

Averaging 8.9 yards for eleven carries in the Baylor-A&M game, Robert Smith, Aggie fullback, regained the top spot as the leading ball carrier in the Southwest Conference.

Smith has carried the ball 86 times for a net gain of 410 yards. Last week's performance raised his average to 4.8 yards. Leon Muscles Campbell of Arkansas is in second place with a net gain of 384 yards for 44 carries. Sonny Whyatt of Rice, Randall Clay of Texas, John Morton of TCU and Bryan Townsend of Texas follow in that order.

In the punting department, A&M's Yale Lary is still in fifth place. He kicked ten times for 394 yards in last week's game. Lary has punted 52 times this season for 1,945 yards.

Kyle Rote of SMU grabbed the top spot as the leading punter in the conference. Rote kicked six times against Kentucky and averaged 49.6 yds. Rote replaces team-mate Doak Walker, who has been sidelined with flu. Dan Wilde of TCU, Doak Walker, and Jimmy Hickey of TCU trail Rote.

Don Nicholas, Aggie quarterback, dropped from sixth place to seventh in the passing department, although he continued to hold a .500 completed average for 230 yards.

Lindy Berry of TCU continued to be the leading passer in the conference. Berry has completed 75 of 142 attempted passes for 1,032 yards and eight touchdowns. Paul Campbell of Texas, Adrian Burk of Baylor, and Tobin Rote of Rice remain in the same spot that they held last week.

John Christenson of A&M, who has not played since the LSU-A&M game, remains in the seventh slot of the leading punt returners in the conference. Christenson has five run backs for a 13.2 yards average.

Chasley Royalty, Cadet halfback, remains in ninth place of the punt returners with an 11.6 yard average.

Wilde led the conference as punt returner with a 24.2 yards average in five returns. Rex Proctor of Rice, returning seven punts for 142 yards, is in second place.

TCU's Morris Bailey out-played Ben Proctor of Texas as he caught five passes last week for a total of 127 yards. Proctor now trails Bailey by 39 yards. Two of the passes caught last week by Bailey were for touchdowns.

J. D. Ison of Baylor replaced George Boal of TCU for third place in pass receiving. Ison has caught

24 passes for 260 yards. Boal trails in fourth place after a poor showing in TCU's game with Old Miss' last week.

Froggie Williams of Rice forged ahead as a leading scorer this week by adding five points to his score from the TU-Rice game last week. Randall Clay of Texas is far ahead in the top spot with 61 points to Williams' 37. Logue of Arkansas trails Williams by only one point.

AP Poll Ranks Rice, Baylor In Nation's Top 10

New York, Oct. 26—AP—Idle Notre Dame still rules the roost as the nation's number one football team according to 84 per cent of the voters in the fourth weekly Associated Press poll.

Despite an open date in the Irish schedule, 120 of the 143 sports writers and broadcasters participating in the balloting put Notre Dame on top for the third straight week. A week ago they received 146 of 179.

Army, on a 63-6 romp over Columbia, strengthened its runner-up position. The Cadets drew 12 first-place votes and a flock of seconds and thirds for a point total of 1,218 as compared to Notre Dame's leading 1,387.

Oklahoma, another of the seven major unbeaten, untied clubs in the top 10, moved up a peg to third on a 48-0 rout of Nebraska. Ten experts who apparently noted that the Sooners yielded only a net gain of four yards to Nebraska's ground attack rated them first. They piled up 1,143 points, only 75 behind Army.

The other first-place ballot went to Michigan State which finished in 12th position.

Rice ranks fifth and Baylor tenth. The wave of upsets had a telling effect on the rankings. Minnesota tumbled from third to seventh after dropping from the unbeaten ranks on a 14-7 loss to Michigan.

North Carolina's first setback, to Louisiana State, 13 to 7, dumped the Tar Heels from sixth to 13th. Kentucky, tripped by Southern Methodist, 20 to 7, fell from seventh to 14th. Pittsburgh's surprising loss to Indiana, 48 to 14, dropped the Panthers right out of the rankings. Nobody voted for Pitt which was 16th a week ago.

California picked up added support on its 21-7 win over Washington and took fourth place with 919 points.

After Notre Dame, Army, Oklahoma and California there is a wide gap to fifth-place Rice, 17-15 conqueror of Texas. Rice has 468 points.

Michigan regained prestige by its victory over Minnesota. The Wolverines fell out of the top 10 for the first time in several years last week but now they're back in sixth position. Despite two defeats, Michigan now is ahead of Minnesota in the rankings.

Gornell, still among the nation's unbeaten after squeaking past Princeton, 14-12, on two points after touchdown, held eighth. Penn moved up five positions from 14th to ninth on its 28-7 victory over

Greiner, a 190-pound guard from Houston, is currently tied with Jim Flowers for lineman of the week honors. Flowers was picked for his performances in the LSU and TCU games. Carl Molberg, a guard who shares duties with Greiner on offense, is the remaining laurel holder. Molberg was the choice after the Texas Tech game.

Baylor to Meet TCU Saturday In Crucial Tilt

Waco, Oct. 26 (Spl.)—Coach Bob Woodruff's undefeated and untied Baylor Bears will face their most critical test of the season Saturday when they face the TCU Frogs before a homecoming crowd of an estimated 20,000 fans in Waco.

The Bruins who are one of the nine undefeated teams in the country, came out of the A&M game of last week in good physical condition and are expected to be in top form for the tilt.

The game marks the second homecoming in a row which Baylor has entered undefeated. Last year they barely edged A&M 20-14 before the alumni.

Baylor will pit its great All-American passer Adrian Burk against TCU's Lindy Berry. Burk has completed 58 passes out of 89 thrown for a net gain of 677 yards and eight touchdowns. The other half of the famed combination, end J. D. Ison of the Bruins has snagged 24 out of 27 thrown to him in Baylor's five games for a net gain of 260 yards and three touchdowns. Two of his misses were against the Aggies last week in the mud.

A heavy rain which fell in Waco Monday prevented the Bears from having an outside practice session, but Coach Bob Woodruff took the Bruins into the Rena Marrs McLean gymnasium for their workout.

As honored guests for the Homecoming tilt will be the Baylor baseball team of 1923 and the football team of 1922 and 1924, the last teams which won a title in those sports for the Bears.

Ken Shobe Injured In Tyler JC Game

Another Aggie Fish football player of '48 has suffered an injury playing for Tyler Junior College. This time the injured athlete is back Kenneth Shobe. Shobe is out with a fracture of his right leg incurred in the San Angelo game last week.

Three weeks ago back Homer Dear was sidelined by injuries, too. Prior to his injury, Dear, the Fort Worth all-star who looked so good for the Fish against Texas, was pacing the scoring of the Rose Capital eleven.

The two backs together with fullback Bernie Lemmons and possibly still other former Cadet freshman performers are members of the powerful Apache squad. The East Texans are undefeated and are favored to drop defending champion Kilgore JC in a tilt this weekend.
