## Students See New Projector Operate

Students taking education and psychology courses were given a demonstration of the Keystone View Company's recently perfected Visual Aids projector last Thursday during the regular lecture periods.

The company's representative, Arthur V. Blake, showed how a teacher could correct both poor reading habits of a student and some eye defects such as cross-eyedness.

He further demonstrated the projector's use in displaying words and pictures which are easier on the students' eyes. All of these services enable the teacher to guide the student better and more efficiently.

The cost of the machine is below \$150, and the many attachments made for it can be bought at a nominal price.

During his demonstration, Blake disclosed that this machine was designed similar to the type projector used by the armed services.

done last year, Bowles said, but the applicants just turned their applications in to the national headquarters.

**Program Paid For**

The program is paid for out of the money the foreign countries would pay for the surplus items they buy. By giving these scholarships it allows the countries to keep the money they would send to the United States within the boundaries of their country, Bowles said.

The scholarship winners are paid in the money of the country that they are studying in. This prevents the United States from having to handle all of the foreign money.

"Almost a straight 'A' transcript is necessary to get to first base", Bowles said to answer a question of what grades are necessary.

The program is open to graduate students and Seniors only. The seniors who apply should be graduating in June, and would be abroad as graduate students, Bowles added.

The money that will be granted to the students is fitted on a sliding scale. It will amount to about \$1,220 in France to \$3,000 in some other countries. In England last year it was \$2,000, Bowles said.

Money is allotted according to the cost of living in the country. Graduate students, who are applying for exchange lectures positions, can not apply for positions beyond that of their comparable positions in institutions in the United States, Bowles said.

**Age Limit**

There is no age limit for the Fulbright scholarship winners, nor is there any ban against married people. The only drawback in the marital status is that the federal government does not pay for the winner's husband or wife. It is possible for the winner to make arrangements to have the money taken out of the monthly allotment for his spouse's ticket, Bowles said.

Applications must be in by November 30 to the local screening committee. The results of the primary screening will be sent in no later than December 15.

Applications of men past the doctorate level must apply to the national headquarters in Washington, D. C., Bowles said.

Additional information on any phase of the program may be secured by writing the Institute of International Education, Washington, D. C., Bowles concluded.

ment each day before she left. This was easy, for all we had left was a rug and a telephone book upon which we took our scanty meals.

I soon bribed the policeman with some old comic-books, and he allowed me a cigarette a day. I'd tear open the weed, scatter the tobacco on the rug, roll the paper up, putting in my ear. I laughed hysterically while my wife futilely searched the room. When she'd shouldered her sledge hammer and gone to the job, I'd gleefully Hoover the rug, re-roll the cigarette, and blissfully inhale the smoke 'into my one uncollared lung.

Then one day I went all smash. I sneaked down the fire escape, and went across town to enter a pipe-smoking contest. Naturally I won—was ahead 15 puffs and a long drag at the finish—but the excess was too much for me.

I awoke in the Nic Ward of the hospital, sweating, having convulsions, and screaming wildly, "Sold American." Pink cigarettes were floating around by head.

And then there was a quite figure standing there who said he could help me. He was a member of Nicotine Anonymous.
