council, Smith said, and a permit has been granted pending outcome of negotiations between the Houston Transit Company and the driver's union.

The parade route, as outlined by Smith, will carry the corps over three main streets in downtown Houston.

The assembly area, which is the same as in 1947, is in front of the railroad station on Smith Street. The corps will form at 9 a. m., November 12.

Route Set

At 10 a. m. the corps will move out of the assembly area and march one block up Smith Street to Preston.

They will travel four blocks on Preston to Main, up Lamar to Sam Houston Park, the dismissal area.

The reviewing stand will be located in front of the Rice Hotel at the corner of Texas and Main. The band will be placed on Texas opposite the reviewing stand.

When the A&M group inspected the parade route yesterday, picking up at several points along Main Street including the area around the Rice Hotel.

All the streets on the route of march are one-way with the exception of Smith and Main, and they are all wide enough so that parking will not have to be restricted. There is no parking on Main Street at any time.

The arrangement committee which represented A&M yesterday consisted of Lt. Col. Joe E. Davis; Lt. Col. M. P. Bowden; Doyle Avant, colonel of the corps; Herman Dietrich, corps operations officer; and C. C. Munroe, corps public information officer.

Biologist Talks To Fish & Game Club

John Lynch, Flyway Biologist with the U. S. Wildlife Service, spoke to the Fish and Game Club Tuesday evening on management problems of ducks and geese.

Lynch outlined the methods employed by the U. S. Wildlife Service in securing data used to fix the daily bag limit of hunters. He said that the airplane, in conjunction with ground crews, has made it possible to predict accurately the duck and geese population for any given year.

According to Lynch, cold fronts are forcing the waterfowl to move south rapidly and the opening of season, Nov. 4, should find heavy concentrations of Mallard ducks and Canadian geese on the Texas coast. While there should be fair numbers of Blue and Snow geese, the Pintail duck will be scarce.

Lynch works on the Mississippi Flyway and flew in from Louisiana to talk to the club.

ities of Hy-Line chickens, Wallace said that 80 million chicks are needed for replacements in Iowa alone, and that he saw no limit to the number of Hy-Lines that could be used to the advantage of poultrymen in the United States. He pointed out that in Iowa in 1930 only one-half of one percent of the corn seed planted was the hybrid variety, and by 1938 more than 90 percent of the Iowa-grown corn was hybrid.

"We have a long way to go," Wallace said, "but we think that what has been done with hybrid corn can be done with hybrid chickens."
