

Wisdom Wooing College Gals Say They're After Culture

Women do a lot of strange things, but just why do they go to college? Question number three on my survey was to answer that query.

Many of the selectees gave the question a great deal of thought before they ventured an answer. This made me stop to wonder if women really knew why they were in college.

By the time I reached this question in each interview, I usually had assumed a comfortable position on the sand and had the selectee talking freely.

But the minute this question arose there was a noticeable change in attitude on the part of the woman.

The majority of the girls avowed that they were attend-

ing college for educational and career reasons. Along this line were such reasons as "to make desirable acquaintances" or "to broaden cultural background."

Almost all secondary answers given concerned social activity. Compare these answers with the top ranking five that appeared recently in a TSCW Daily Lasso editorial. They were:

- (1) Preparation for marriage and family life
- (2) Intelligence and wisdom necessary to live a full life
- (3) Training for a particular occupation or profession
- (4) Sharper, better trained mind in dealing with all sorts of problems.
- (5) Learning to get along with all sorts of people

Back to our selectees once again, our New Mexico lass was still smiling as she said, "I'm going to college for insurance against the fu-

ture, but primarily, to meet men."

Here was a young lady whom it was not necessary to judge on the basis of the last question, for she had come up with the answer toward which the poll was directed.

By the time the selectee had committed herself as to her opinion of girls' colleges, college men, and reasons for her being in college, it was an easy matter to judge her answer to the last question as it applied to her.

You have often heard the statement that women go to college to find husbands, but if you were to ask women if this was true, what reply would you receive?

If you were to ask it of them on a personal basis, you would, in most cases, get a flat denial. With that fact in mind, I worded the question in the following way:

"Based upon the girls with whom you have come in contact in college, how much truth would you say was in the statement that 'the majority of women go to college to find mates?' What percentage would you say come to college for that reason alone?"

If there is one thing a woman can and will talk about, it's another woman.
