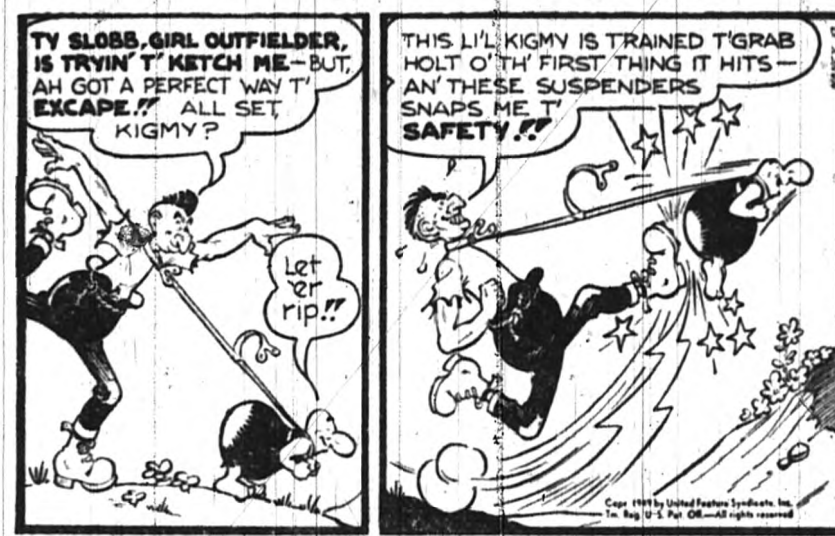

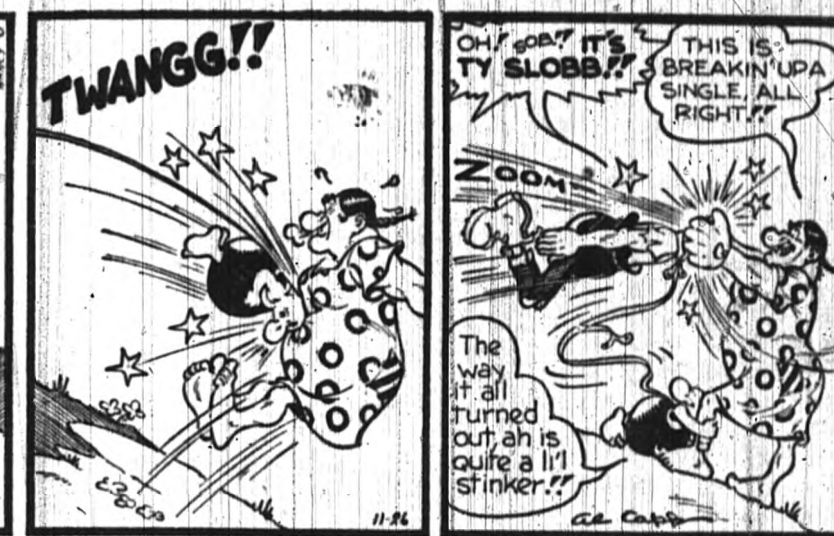

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## Lords Delay Steel Nationalization

London (AP)—The Labor Government yielded to the Conservative House of Lords today and deferred the date for nationalizing the British steel industry.

This clears the legislative decks for an early general election, probably in February or March, in which government ownership of the steel mills will be a major issue.

The government offered an amendment in the House of Commons changing the date the industry would be taken over from May 1, 1950, to January 1, 1951 or a date not more than 12 months later.

The Lords had insisted the bill should not be effective until July 1, 1951, so that the voters could first express their opinion of it at a general election.

If the government had refused to compromise on the effective dates of the steel nationalization bill, the Lords could have delayed final enactment until after the House recesses for Christmas Dec. 16, even though a government bill curbing the Lord's veto power passed the House last night, 340 to 187.
