Rapidly Rising Science Hall Has 260-Seat Lecture Room

science building is rapidly disap-pearing, and in its place the new science hall is taking shape. Even the casual passer-by can note daily additions to the structure.

This \$560,481 building is being built by the J. W. Bateson Company of Dallas and is sup-posed to consume 225 work days. It was started last August and should be ready for classwork by next September.

Some of the improvements over the old science hall that will be most noticed by students lucky enough to have courses in the new building next fall will be a fine lecture room, featuring built-in loudspeakers in the walls, a projection booth for visfaces, and a seating capacity of

In the alcove adjoining the lecture room will be a wall advarium and a glass display case for live animals. Even the coke-box has its own little nook.

Under the high end of the lecture room will be a workshop. where repairing of equipment and


