Sweetheart to Be Chosen

Highlights of the night will be the presentation of the freshman sweetheart who will be selected at the dance from a group of six fi-

nalists chosen from pictures submitted by Freshman class members. The sweetheart will be given flowers and a gift from the class by Freshman President Jack Brooks.

In deciding upon rules for the selection of the sweetheart, the officers set Friday, February 17 as the last day for submitting pictures of nominees.

The name of the man turning in the picture must be written on a sheet of paper and attached to the picture. Also to be included on the paper will be the girl's name, age, and residence (school or home).

The pictures must be at least 3 x 5 inches in size of the portrait type. They will be accepted by Mrs. Ann Hilliard in the Student Center until 5 p.m. the seven-

teenth. One snapshot may be included if the person nominating a girl so desires. Judging will be done by a group to be named at a later meeting of the dance committee.

Tickets will be sold for \$2.00 each to class members. Kent Markey, ticket chairman, said that tickets will be placed in each barracks, probably with barracks chiefs. The \$2.00 admission price will include refreshments consisting of soft drinks and cookies.

The group decided to admit seniors with dates if they have tickets.

Probably few tears were shed when the announcement was made stating the lease on the Annex would expire at the completion of the Spring semester.

In use for college instruction since 1946, the Bryan Army Air Field was constructed by the army in 1942 as a temporary air base to be occupied not longer than five years.

What use the army will have for the buildings as they now are is difficult to conceive, but if our guess is right, they will find little more than a stockpile of well-used lumber in them.

The Annex was leased in 1946 by the college in order to alleviate the temporary space shortage caused by the overflow of veterans returning for college instruction.

As far as we know, the general consensus among the freshmen now at the Annex is that moving all students back on the main campus will be the best thing this college has done since the establishment of the A&M Annex.

And so, come June 1 or close thereafter, the Annex will be only one of the many features which the college can add to its list of stepping stones passed over toward a greater A&M College.
