European Work-Study Tour

The European Work-Study Seminars will be open to six groups of eighteen students who will sail together on a Student Ship about June 26 for England. After spending a week together in London, each of the groups will visit a different city in England and Scotland.

Another two weeks, will spent by each group in two of the following countries: Austria, Bel-gium, Denmark, Holland, Italy, and, if arrangements can be made. in Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia. Students will spend the eighth week in the European-American Conference of the World's Student Christian-Federation, near Geneva. Switzerland. Approximate dates for the seminars are from June 20 through September 15.

Total minimum cost for the project, open to students of all races and creeds, will be from \$750 to \$850, and will include transportation, meals, registration fee, and lodgings.

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


