

# Student Summer Projects Available Here and Abroad

College students throughout the nation are being offered opportunities for summer work and seminar programs in this nation and abroad. Information on at least five of these programs is available at the YMCA on the campus.

Covering an average period of eight weeks, the projects are designed to include many phases of social, religious and educational activities and to better acquaint the college student with the social and economic forces at work in our world today.

Included in the list of offerings are European Work-Study Seminars, the St. Louis Summer Service Project, the New York Summer Service Group, the Washington Student Citizenship Seminar, and the Geneva Leadership Seminar.

**European Work-Study Tour**  
The European Work-Study Seminars will be open to six groups of eighteen students who will sail together on a Student Ship about June 26 for England. After spending a week together in London, each of the groups will visit a different city in England and Scotland.

Another two weeks will be spent by each group in two of the following countries: Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Holland, Italy, and if arrangements can be made, in Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

Students will spend the eighth week in the European-American Conference of the World's Student Christian Federation, near Geneva, Switzerland. Approximate dates for the seminars are from June 20 through September 15.

Total minimum cost for the project, open to students of all races and creeds, will be from \$750 to \$850, and will include transportation, meals, registration fee, and lodgings.

St. Louis Project  
For the St. Louis Summer Ser-

vice Project, approximately 20 qualified students will be chosen for placement in agencies for 30 hours of work per week for eight weeks. They will study the social and economic background of work carried on by the YMCA and the YWCA in the larger cities.

Jobs will include recreation and club leadership, coaching in sports, teaching handicraft and other interesting groups, and having an apprentice experience in the general field of social work.

ed thirty-one two hundred fortieths of one cent per pound when the market value is 4 cents per pound.

Revenue from carbon black taxes was figured at \$2,480,000 for the next 18 months.

Cigaretts bear a state tax of 3 cents per pack. The yield at that rate in 18 months would be \$32,291,510.

Motor carriers pay a tax of 2.2 per cent of gross receipts from intrastate business. Tax yield—\$106,000.

Transfer of stock certificates or shares carries a 3-cent levy on each certificate or share of \$100 face value. Yield \$227,000. Oil and gas well servicing bears a tax of 2.2 per cent of gross receipts. Yield—\$945,000.

Insurance companies pay taxes varying from 1 to 3 1/2 per cent according to investments in defined Texas securities. Yield—\$1,430,000.

Now for the prospective increases in tax rates:

The legislature proposes to take cigarettes out of the omnibus tax bill and increase the tax rate on that product one cent, making a total state tax of 4 cents on each pack.

The boost would bring in an estimated extra \$11,744,444 in the next 18 months. However, this particular tax increase would remain in effect until Sept. 1, 1957. Total revenue from cigarettes in the next 18 months would be \$44,035,954. The money raised by the extra penny tax is the only part of the total earmarked to aid hospitals and special schools.

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE, OFFERING FOR SALE, EXPLOSION, STORAGE OR POSSESSION OF COMBUSTIBLE FIREWORKS AND PROVIDING A PENALTY THEREFOR. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer for sale, explode, store or possess any fireworks within the corporate limits of the City of College Station.

Section 2. Any person, firm, association or corporation that shall be found guilty of violating any portion of this ordinance shall be fined not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be effective from and after passage and publication. Passed and approved the 9th day of January, 1950. APPROVED: Ernest Langford Mayor

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## ORDINANCE NO. 139

A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE QUESTION OF REZONING LOTS 5 AND 6 AND A 6.1 FOOT STRIP OF LOT 4 BORDERING ON SAID LOTS 5 OF BLOCK 1 OF THE WEST PARK ADDITION CHANGING THE CLASSIFICATION FROM TRACT NUMBER FOUR AND ORIGINALLY ZONING THREE TWO DESCRIBED TERRITORIES TO TRACT NUMBER FOUR CHANGING A PUBLIC HEARING.

WHEREAS, the zoning commission, after preliminary consideration and a public hearing, has recommended the rezoning of certain territory and the original zoning of certain territory, both of which territory hereinafter more fully described, now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a public hearing shall be held at 8:00 p. m. at the City Hall on March 23, 1950 on the questions of zoning as follows:

a. To rezone so as to change the classification from District Number Three (Apartments) to District Number Four (Business District) all that certain property more fully described as follows to-wit: Lot 4 bordering on said Lot 5, all said Lots being in Block 1 of the West Park Addition, said addition being platted and recorded as of January 20, 1948 in Volume 102, page 108 of the Deed Records of Brazos County, Texas.

b. To zone originally a Number one Residential Area, all the land more fully described as follows, to-wit:

1. The southeast corner of College Hills Estates. This corner also being the most easterly point on the boundary line of District Number Four Addition; thence N 45° E along an old fence line a distance of 265.4 ft. to the most northerly corner of said Lot 16.

Thence S 45° W along the northeast side of said Lot 16, a distance of 845.7 ft. to a point for corner.

Thence S 45° W along the northwest side of Lot 16, a distance of 845.7 ft. to a point for corner.

Thence S 45° W along the southeast side of said Lot 16, a distance of approximately 1700 ft. to the southeast corner of Lot 7, Woodland Estates. (This point also being located N 45° E 310 ft. from the southeast corner of Lot 7, Woodland Estates.)

Thence S 45° W along the southeast side of said Lot 7, Woodland Estates to the most southerly corner of said Lot 7; Thence N 45° W along the northeast side of said Lot 7, a distance of approximately 608.3 ft. to the most southerly corner of Lot 4, Woodland Estates.

Thence S 45° W along the northeast side of said Lot 4, a distance of approximately 1550 ft. to the most southerly corner of Lot 4, Woodland Acres;

Thence S 45° W along the northeast boundary of College Hills Estates to the point of beginning.

2. Beginning at the south corner of Lot 1 Block 1 of the Southeast College Park Addition to the City of College Station, Brazos County, Texas;

Thence N 45° E along the southeast side of said Lot 1 a distance of 150 feet to the east corner of said Lot 1;

Thence N 45° W along the northeast side of said Lot 1 Block 1 a distance of 100 feet to the north corner of the said Lot 1 Block 1;

Thence S 45° E along the southeast side of said Lot 1 Block 1 a distance of approximately 590.5 feet to the south corner of Lot 12 Block 6 of the said Southeast College Park Addition to the City of College Station;

Thence N 45° W along the northeast side of Fairview Avenue a distance of 312 feet to the west corner of Lot 5 Block 4 of said Freesty Heights Addition;

Thence S 45° W a distance of 50 feet to the southwest side of Fairview Avenue;

Thence S 45° W along the southwest side of Fairview Avenue a distance of approximately 850 feet to the southeast side of Luther Street;

Thence N 45° E along the southeast side of Luther Street a distance of 200 feet to the northeast side of an alley;

Thence S 45° E along the northeast side of said alley, a distance of approximately 434 feet;

Thence N 45° E a distance of 40 feet to the northeast side of South Hereford Street;

Thence N 45° W along the northeast side of Hereford to the south corner of Lot 1 Block 1 of said Southeast College Park.

Section 2. Notice shall be given by publication in the official paper at least fifteen (15) days prior to said public hearing in order to inform interested parties and citizens desiring to be heard.
