State Democratic Committee Invites Truman to Visit A&M

The state executive committee of the Democratic party voted to ask President Harry Truman to visit Texas A & M College during the school's 75th anniversary observance this year. The committee made this move in a meeting Saturday at McAllen, Texas. Meeting in the Rio Grande Valley for the first time, including a side trip to Mexico, the committee lost no time in implementing the Supreme Court order which this week dissolved an injunction barring two liberal Tarrant County members from serving on the group. The ruling party organization decreed by resolution that no one could attend the September meeting without credentials approved by a county chairman who had signed the 1948 pledge to support President Truman and Vice President Barkley. Written Pledge Required A few minutes later, they adopted another stand that no one could attend a precinct or county convention this summer without a written pledge to support the nominees of the party. Both resolutions were adopted without dissent in the committee's second consecutive harmony session. But, as stated by Committee-man Stuart Long from Austin, the state regulatory body was guided by an 8 to 1 opinion of the Supreme Court. The court, in effect, held that the party could demand loyalty. While at it, the executive committee went through the formality of numberign three places on the court which will be up for election this summer.

Wrestling Ends With Final Tilts Tomorrow

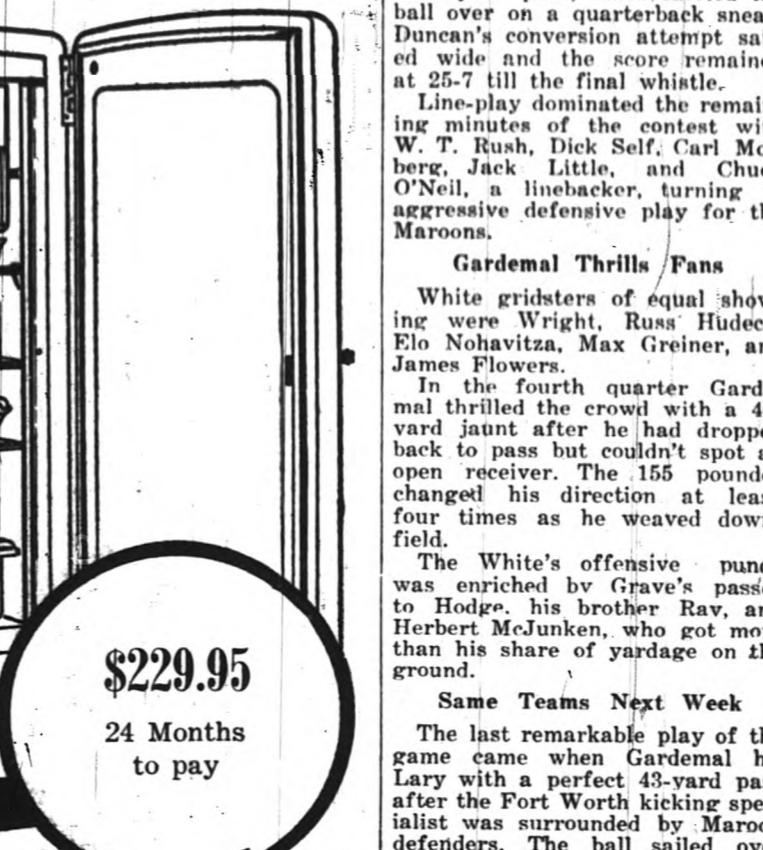
