

London Speaks At Industrial Teacher Meet

"The psychological and philosophical bases of industrial education are undergoing some fundamental changes," Dr. Hoyt H. London of the University of Missouri said Saturday at the Industrial Teacher Conference.

Speaking at a luncheon at noon in Sbis Hall, the speaker told the more than 50 present that "involved in this change is the concept of how people learn and particularly the transfer of training."

"There is a tendency," the speaker pointed out, "in the field of vocational industrial education to pre-employment training to job families rather than to specific jobs to confine in-service training to highly specialized instruction dealing with specific jobs."

"In the field of industrial arts, there is a trend toward the general shop as against the unit shop and toward more exploratory and guidance values and work in human education. In all forms of industrial education there is a trend to better trained and qualified teachers."

Man, Two Youths Booked in Theft

Bob Warren Roberts and Robert Leon Sonfield Jr. were charged in Bryan last week with theft of three drafting machines stolen from the Engineering Drawing Department. Both were former students who withdrew from school here Jan. 30.

Oran J. Worsham, Houston office supply man, was charged in Justice Court in Bryan with receiving and concealing stolen property. The three machines are valued at about \$125.

In a statement to County Attorney Davis Grant, Worsham said he sold the machines to R. L. Sargeant of Houston. Worsham thought Sargeant had become suspicious upon buying all three machines for only \$60, had stopped payment on the check and called the police.

Worsham, 21, was released on \$1,000 bond, pending action by the Grand Jury, which convenes March 16.

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Spellman Forsees War, Asks Faithful to Pray

Rome, March 6—(AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman warned Sunday that signs of war are increasing.

He urged the faithful to be "always prepared for death." In one of his gravest pronouncements, the visiting archbishop of New York told reporters:

"Last week it was published in newspapers that American scientists say it is possible to construct one bomb capable of destroying all human life.

"While we hope and pray and strive for peace, we nevertheless must be, as Catholics, always prepared for death. Certainly, signs of the 'abomination of desolation' are increasing."

The "abomination of desolation" is an expression usually taken to mean approaching ruin from war or other disaster.

The Catholic encyclopedia says, "the importance of this scriptural expression is chiefly derived from the fact that (it) is given by Our Lord to His disciples as the signal for their flight from Judea at the time of the approaching ruin of Jerusalem (Luke XXI, 20)."

Cardinal Spellman's remarks were made in reply to a reporter's question: "Do you believe the threat of war is greater or less than it was when you visited Rome last October?"

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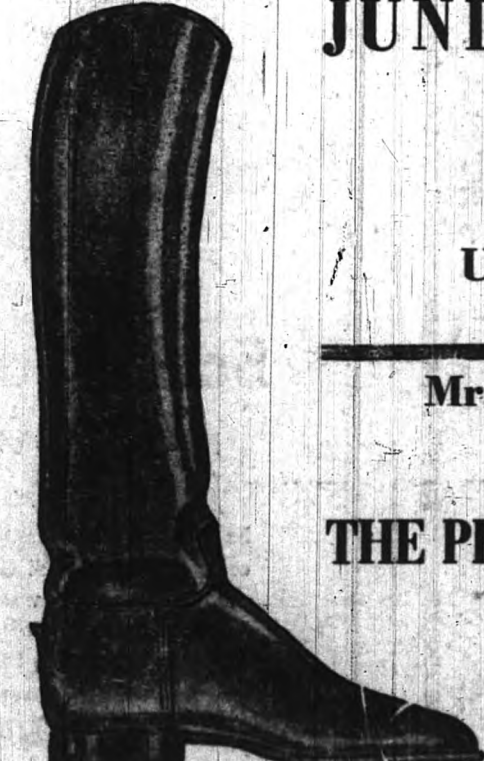
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
