## Darby Leads Cadet Golfers In 4-2 Win

The Aggie golf team, led by Gene Darby, opened its 1950 season yesterday by defeating the Southwest Texas State Bobcats of San Marcos, 4-2, on the Bryan Country Club course.

Darby, the Aggie No. 1 man, got off to a bad start on a course where high winds were prevailing and swilled Rose Hoff of the Bobcats for the first nine holes. It wasn't until the fifteenth hole that Darby caught his opponent and then on the sixteenth hole the Farmer golfer shot a birdie-two to take the lead.

Darby followed his lead closely defeating Hoff on the seventeenth and eighteenth holes to turn what looked like a 3-3 tie into a 4-2 victory for the home team.

Led by their No. 1 man, Aggie team members took two more singles and one double match as high scores were the order of the day because of the cold, windy weather.

In the singles events Darby defeated Hoff, 2-1; J. C. Fletcher, A&M, won over Bud Davis, 5-3; Tom Aitken, A&M, outpitted Milton Cash, 6-5; and Jim Russell, San Marcos, defeated Monte Currie, 2-up.

In the doubles division Darby and Fletcher routed Hoff and Davis, 4-2, while Russell and Cash split the doubles bill beating Aitken and Currie, 2-up.

Fletcher and Russell tied for low scoring honors for the afternoon, each shooting a 76.

## Maroons Threaten Olympics Records

Laredo, Tex., March 9.—(AP)—Texas A&M athletes are expected to play a major part in endangering six meet records and numerous divisional marks in the eighteenth annual border olympics before the nation's first big outdoor track and field meet of the year is completed Saturday night in Laredo.

University and College preliminaries will begin Saturday morning. Finals in the high school and junior college division will be held Saturday afternoon. The meet will be concluded Saturday night with the finals in the College and University divisions.

J. D. Hampton, Texas A&M distance star may break two records he set in the olympics last year. He established the mile record of 4:18.7 and the two-mile record of 9:36.0 all in the same night.

Both Oklahoma A&M and Rice have mile relay teams capable of bettering the olympics mile relay record set by Texas A&M last year of 3:17.1.

Rice's quarter miler the event in 3:13 in the Los Angeles Coliseum relays last year, and the Oklahoma A&M foursome won the Sugar Bowl relay last New Year's Day.

One of the closest races in this year's olympics is expected in the University division half-mile. The winner of the race may break the formidable record of 1:55.6 set by Wayne Rideout of North Texas State in 1938.

Rice has two men who have come close to that record. Otha Byrd won the Southwest Conference championship 880 in 1:55.9 last year and teammates Jim Hoff was only a step behind in 1:56 flat.

Ortiz Another Possibility  
Alexander Ortiz of Texas A&M ran the 880 in 1:57 on a slow track in a dual meet with North Texas State last week.

Another runner given a good chance of setting an 880 record is Mike Mercado of East Texas State.

Only border olympics field event record which appears likely to fall is the shot put mark of 46 feet 11 inches. Big George Kadera of Texas A&M, who set the record in 1948, will be back to attempt to break it.

Bob Walters of Texas and Vern McGrew of Rice have both jumped higher than the 6 feet 7 1/2 inches high jump record set by Pete Watkins of Texas A&M in 1943, but neither is expected to go that high this early in the season.

Walters Topped World  
Walters jumped 6 feet 8 3/16 inches in the Kansas relays last year, the highest of any human in the world in 1949.

Charley Parker, the University of Texas sprint star who holds three border olympics records and shares another, is rated a good chance of breaking his own 220-yard dash mark of 21.1 seconds which he set last year.

Perry Samuels, defending Southwest Conference champion in the 100-yard dash, ran a 9.7 century in a Texas practice meet last week and will be favored to take the border olympics race.

Followers of the Aggie baseball team will have two chances to see the men of Marty Karow in action this weekend when the medical men of Brooke Army Air Base at San Antonio invade the recently renovated diamond of Kyle Field on Friday and Saturday afternoons.

Game time for tomorrow's tilt has been set at 3:00 p. m. and the Saturday tussle, which is a part of Sports Day, will begin at 2:30 p. m. Fans desiring a program identifying Aggie players can refer to tomorrow's Battalion.

The squad has spent many days whipping back into playing condition with Karow stressing batting and fielding. The boys usually appear for workouts between 5 a.m. and three-thirty, and as Karow puts it, "go at it hot and heavy till they hear the whistle of the train which arrives at 6:10 in the afternoon."

## Train Ends Practices

With the arrival of the train, the team concludes its last phase of the daily training program—field work, and Karow uses his fungo-bat to send hot grounders across the neatly-trimmed grass that are near-imitations of the train's whistle.

The Cadets will miss Cotton Lindloff, all conference second-base man who graduated last year, but they will have Guy Wallace, a shortstop who also nailed down an all-conference berth, and a few newcomers which Karow briefly summed up as, "they're looking good."

According to the veteran baseball coach, southpaw Bruce Morise will be the likely starting chucker for the Ags with Pat Hubert, Blanton Taylor, George Brown, Sam Blanton, Bob Tankersley, and Sid Goodloe slated to see action on the mound sometime during the scheduled 18 innings.

## Hubert Classbound

Karow had originally planned to start Hubert, but the right-hander will have to meet his regular Friday afternoon lab class. Hubert's lab commitment won't change Karow's plans, because he plans to use the 19 innings for experimentation.

Jim Calvert and Al Ogletree are the chief candidates for the backstop position; Calvert, a senior from Austin, will start tomorrow's game.

Holding down the initial sack will be Hershell Maltz, a left-hand batting, left-hand throwing

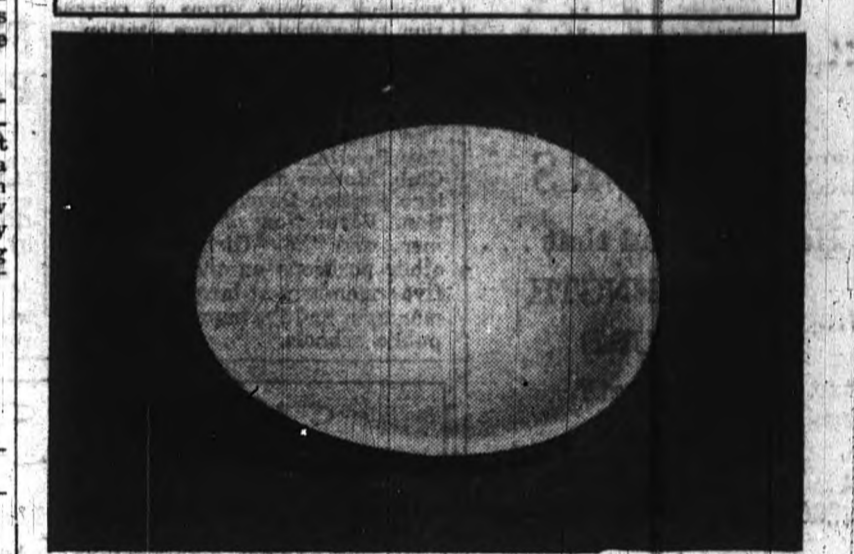
veteran. The Cadets may have what promises to be one of the most efficient double-play units in the league. Wallace at shortstop and little Joe Savarino at second, comprise the keystone combination.

Henry Candelari or Lester Lacky will be stationed at the hot corner. Lacky plans to use sophomore Lacky as a utility man during the season.

Competition is keenest for outfield slots. Approximately eight garden-patrollers are trying for the three positions. Probable starters are Billy McPherson in right, Hollis Baker in center, and either Wally Moon or John DeWitt in left field. Phillip Russel was first put an tap for left, but entered the hospital earlier this week with flu.

Getting a late start along with DeWitt and Moon are Tex Farmer and Yale Lary who were confined to basketball and football practice.

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
