College Given Deans Portrait

An oil painting of Edwin J. Kyle, '99, former dean of agriculture here, will be presented to the college this year.

Seymour Stone, internationally known artist, will paint Dean Kyle's portrait, commerating his long service and accomplish-ments in the field of agriculture and United States-Latin American relations.

Arrangements for the portrait were made by the following: John C. Mayfield, A&M graduate of 1923, Houston; Walter T. Burns, Monterrey, Mexico; James P. Hamblen, Houston; Sterling C. Evans, Houston; and Ted W. Mohle, Houston.

Dean Kyle was born at Kyle Texas, in 1876, and came to A&M as a student in 1896, graduating in June 1899. While a student, he was senior captain in command of the cadet corps, president of his class and valedictorian, among other honors.

He later received another B. S. degree from Cornell University. In 1902, Cornell conferred a master of science in agriculture upon
