There is supposed to be an unwritten law requiring critics and reviewers to be fittingly impartial in their appraisal of what is placed before the public eye as entertain-ment. Nuts!

To those who read today's col-umn with the intention of gath-ering the unbiased and carefully though out facts on the worth of "Young Man With A Horn," we say "don't."

So impressed are we with Kirk Douglas' acting, Harry James trumpet playing, and Doris Day's singing that we re-fuse to call their latest picture an off-key muddle of maudin excesses and hoary plot com-plications contrived by scripters who thought they could do a bet-ter job with the story than the original author.

We refuse to mention Lauren Bacall's name. If we did, we would have to say that she seems to be picking up a little of hubby Humphrey's capacity for dismal performances. As a sultry, sophisticated neurotic who hasn't found herself yet, Miss Bacall mouths lines, which must have been pilfered from old Greta Garbo pictures, in a way that suggests she is trying hard to imitate Tallulah Bankhead. Perhaps Warners would have done better by letting Miss Bankhead read the lines while Miss Bacall went through the motions.

Doris pours her peach-es and cream voice over old favorites like "The Very Thought of You," "I May Be Wrong," and "With A Song In My Heart," while the invisible James plays an alternately jazz and sweet trumpet with a zest and warmth that have lately been missing from his style.

Photography is appropriately imaginative, particularly when the camera followed a crocked-upDouglas as he roams the New York streets, and when it roots around in smoke-filled cabarets, picking up shirt-sleeved jazz combos which make with the "soul" music
