

All Faiths To Raise Funds For Israel

A goal of \$2,000 has been set for the Bryan-College Station area in the fund-raising campaign for the United Jewish Appeal according to Josh Treiman, chairman of this area and president of the A&M Hillel Foundation.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. is chairman of the National Christian Committee of 111 prominent U. S. Citizens who will ask Americans of all faiths to support the 1950 drive for \$272,455,800 to operate the Appeal's three agencies dealing with immigrants to Israel, relief for Jews in Europe and Moslem lands, and refugees coming to the United States.

Referring to his newly-formed committee, Roosevelt said, "These outstanding citizens are acting in the finest tradition of American philanthropy in helping to rescue and rehabilitate the hundreds of thousands of Jews who lost their homes and their means of earning a livelihood during World War II."

Senator Robert Taft has urged generous American support, saying, "The moral and material aid which individual Americans and our government give now to the Republic of Israel represents an investment in humanity and also in the future of the ideals of freedom and peace."

Humanitarian Problem
Speaking in behalf of the UJA, Vice-president Alben W. Barkley declared the aid to Israel as "more than a Jewish problem—it is a humanitarian problem."

"We cannot afford not to help a free nation in the Middle East so essential to the security of our liberty and ideals," Barkley continued. "We need a free Israel among the nations of the World. Israel may be a vital influence in the peace of the world as a friend and associate of the United States."

The drive began March 15th and will last through Easter. All contributions from this area should be brought or mailed to Bessie Zinn, Room 102, Goodwin Hall, College Station, Texas.

Ninety-four cases of sickness were recorded by the Brazos County Health Unit for the week ending March 25, 1950.

Influenza was responsible for 75 cases, measles, mumps, sore throat, and two cases of Gonorreha accounted for the other cases.

The Brazos County Health Unit is under the joint-sponsorship of Brazos County, the cities of Bryan and College Station, Texas A&M College, and the Texas State Health Department.
