Sponsored by the College Station Development Association and Chamber of Commerce, the clean-up drive will continue through April 19. H. E. Burgess, president, and Mayor Ernest Langford, with the assistance of City Manager Raymond Rogers, are planning the city's most successful spick-and-span campaign.

Dr. Sidney O. Brown, professor of biology and chairman of the association's health committee, heads the over-all drive. Assisting him are Dr. G. E. Potter, professor of zoology; Dr. E. E. Holt, president of the Brazos County Tuberculosis Association; Mrs. Frank Anderson, and Mrs. W. M. Dowell. Mrs. Anderson is chairman of a subcommittee which will make a house-to-house canvass reminding residents of their role in the clean-up campaign.

On her committee are Mrs. J. T. L. McNew, Mrs. William Fitch, and Mrs. Robert Darrow. Mrs. Dowell, a registered nurse, heads the child health subcommittee. Free pick-up service in the business and residential district will be offered in all sections of College Station, Burgess said. Burgess asks residents and business owners to place trash and debris either in front of their homes or in an adjoining alley large enough to permit trucks to enter. The city and college also are cooperating in an extensive spraying schedule to eliminate fly and mosquito breeding places which will be sprayed about every two weeks from now through October.
