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TB Unit X-rays 1282 Persons At Bryan Field

The Annex came through with flying colors last week in the TB Chest X-ray drive sponsored by the Brazos County TB Association with a total of 1282 x-rays taken during the two day stay at Bryan Field.

Six hundred eighty-two people were registered the first day with the crew of ladies from Bryan and the Annex that took care of the paper chores in the outer office of the room in the Administration Building.

Physical education classes were dismissed during the two days in order for students to come by for the x-rays at regular intervals instead of between and after classes.

A large portion of the people x-rayed came from the Vocational School located adjacent to Bryan Air Field. Veterans wives and college employees at the Annex also helped round out the total amount.

Upholding the variety show

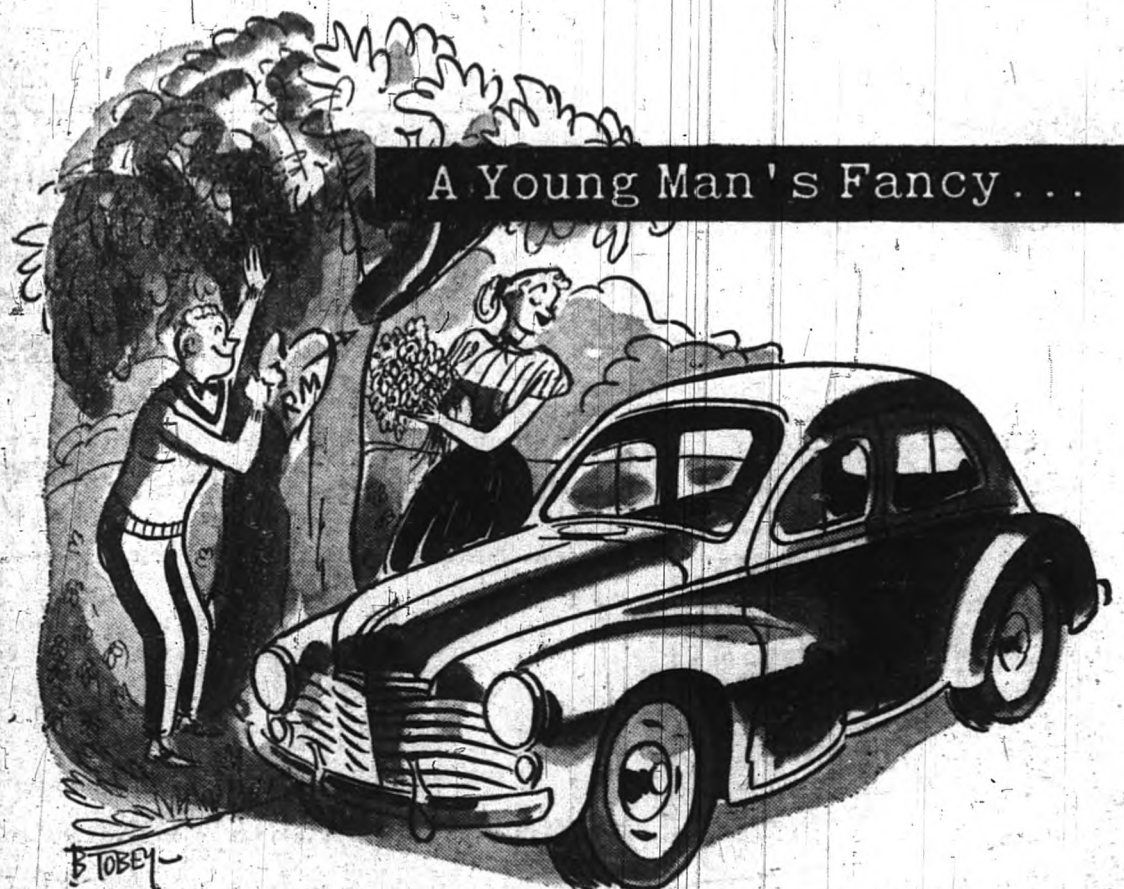

Approximately 10% of the people questioned had no comment to make in the matter or they preferred to remain silent.



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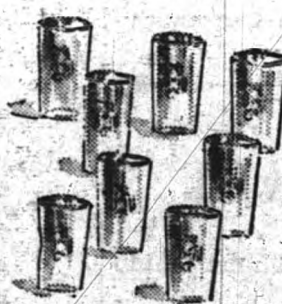
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Mother's Day Activities Committees Appointed
