#### Dallas

Lou-Anns—Greenville and Lever's Lane. Lou-Anns pipes juke box music to its habitués, who have paid a 75c cover to dance and drink amid the pine-knotted walls.

The Chalet—6400 Gaston Ave. Cozy and swank with its Swiss dining lodge atmosphere, the chalet goes easy on the pocketbook. Guests may dance to the rhythms of the Leonard Olson trio for a \$1.60 cover charge (\$1 on week-days), which is deductible from steak dinners.

Burch's—Corner of North and Carroll. Jungle atmosphere at Burch's, walls adorned with jungle murals, everything else engulfed in leopard skin covers. A colored gent plays an ardent boogie piano and philosophizes about the Kinsey report.

#### Waco

## Now Five Year Veteran, HST Calls Own Plays

Washington, April 14.—Harry S. Truman started his sixth year as president yesterday, a vastly more confident man than the shaken substitute called by tragedy to take command in the greatest nation and the biggest war.

He is captain and quarterback on the first team now, confirmed by the people's vote. And as such he is calling his own plays instead of trying to base decisions on what Franklin D. Roosevelt would have done.

It was just five years ago Wednesday that President Roosevelt died at Warm Springs, Ga., and Vice President Truman was called hurriedly to the White House to be sworn in as his successor.

Today friends described the president as a man full of confidence and ready to fight for his own solutions to America's problems.

The day found him in the middle of plans to do just that, in a "whistle stop" speechmaking drive

across the nation next month.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, democratic leader in the Senate, described the president's attitude and views to a reporter:

"He is confident and in a happy frame of mind. He thinks conditions throughout the country are good. He thinks world problems are not insolvable. He is ready to fight for his program."

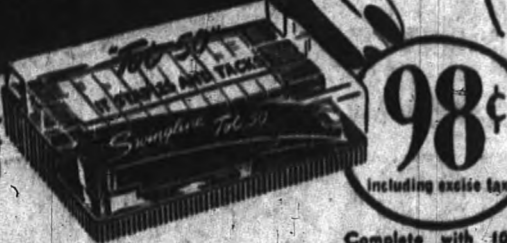
