It is centered around the suggestion of devising ome means whereby those who shopped on rare occasions could quickly locate wanted articles without interrupting the employees during busy periods.

The premium plan is unique in that it offers a means of using advertising money most effective ly where prices, quality, conven-ience, and other factors are the same in similar stores. The plan consists of the cus-

He also said that if all of the cash receipts were redeemed, 25 to 30 sets of pottery with a retail value of \$2.95 each would be given away

Oden expects to use the pottery premium plan for the remainder of 1950 and is going to use the same plan or a similar one from year to year.

and other commodities. Extension Drive There will be a big drive during the next session to extend these into a general sales tax. There will be proposals for a state income tax, for increases in the tax on natural gas and crude oil, and probably for more taxes on the

growing chemical industry. Announcement of a plan for any one of these, including the sales tax, will bring on a finish fight

at Austin. So while you're asking your prospective legislators or candi-dates for lieutenant governor embarrassing questions, you might as well include these:

1. If you favor cutting expenses, where will you start, on funds for education, welfare or roads? (That's where 90 per cent of the state money goes).

2. If you're not going to trim, where are you going to get the money- General sales tax? Increase in the tax on natural gas or oil? Chemical tax? Income tax ?.

Final tip to the voter: Get it in writing.




