All ministers and faculty members who wish to recommend any student for the Henry Cohen-Hillel Inter-faith Fellowship Award should do so before May 1, Mrs. Esther Taubenhauz, director of the Hillel Foundation, has announced.

The \$300 fellowship is awarded each year by the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation to a student, preferably a junior, who has in the opinion of a faculty selection committee, done the most to promote interfaith amity and better group relations on the campus, Mrs. Taubenhauz said.

In Cohen's Honor

Three years old, the fellowship is in honor of 82 year old Rabbi Henry Cohen of Galveston, Texas, who has been friend, counselor and spiritual guide to men and women of all faiths throughout Texas for more than half a century.

N. R. Leatherwood was the first recipient of the award. Don Jarvis, who is presently a fifth year architecture student from Ft. Worth, won it in 1947. Last year's winner was Jarvis Miller, Ag-Economics major from Orange Grove. Miller presented a program in the interest of inter-faith relations last week in the YMCA.

Interviews, Vacation Talk Given by Taylor

Tom H. Taylor, supervisor of the information service of the Texas Highway Department, spoke to the Campus Study Club, yesterday, on "vacationing in Texas". He accompanied his talk with color slides of Palo Duro Canyon, Big Bend National Park, and Texas wildflowers.

"I would like to commend the Campus Study Club for their progressive attitude in sponsoring a program of this kind to educate people on the spots of beauty and recreation in our state," Taylor said.

In addition to Taylor's talk and slides, Program Co-chairmen Mrs. Fred Smith and Mrs. F. A. Lynch arranged exhibits which included historical documents of the Battle of San Jacinto and Texas history, numerous folders on recreation spots of Texas, and other travel information.

Taylor presented each person present with a special travel folder containing information on recreation spots, imaginary tours, wildflowers and state parks.

Besides speaking to the study club, Taylor is here to interview students who are interested in summer jobs with the information service, which is a section of the Traffic Services Division of the Highway Department, headed by Fred T. Bennett.

"We want men who are inter-

ested in promoting and directing travel in Texas and stimulating recreation in the state which is the purpose of the information service," Taylor said.

"There are 10 bureaus of information near or on the border which give out information and literature on the state designed to aid and assist the public and encourage travel. Some of these bureaus need extra personnel during the summer and I am here to interview interested students," he continued.

X-ray Unit Ends Survey at College

A total of 13,024 persons were X-rayed for chest pictures during the three week survey conducted in Brazos County, according to Mrs. A. A. Blumberg, executive secretary of the Brazos County Tuberculosis Association.

Of this total 1,437 were made at A&M Annex, 6,161 in Bryan, and 5,426 at the YMCA at College Station.

"Individuals may expect a report of the results through the mail from the State Health Department in Austin within two weeks," said Dr. D. E. Brown, director of the local health unit.

"If a chest disorder is indicated in the X-ray, a report will be sent from Austin to the individual's physician," Dr. Brown added.

W. L. Penberthy, dean of men at A&M, said that more students reported for X-rays this year than last year, even though the enrollment is not as great.

This year's survey made 3,276 more X-rays than the combined county survey during November, 1947 and the A&M survey conducted January, 1948. Only 9,748 adults reported for X-rays during these two surveys.
