DeBerry Trips Oates; Fish Trounce Hi Park

Unbeaten Team Continues Intact

One of A&M's best freshman tennis teams in many years remained undefeated after whitewashing Highland Park High School of Dallas last Saturday, 6-0, on the local clay courts.

The fish, led by Galveston's Eugene Letson, captured all but two handsily, having a close call in the No. 1 singles and the No. 2 doubles.

Letson, after losing the first set, 4-6, and down 4-5 and 0-40 in the second, came back brilliantly to edge Highland Park's Walter Miller, 4-6, 9-7, 6-4. The match was probably one of the best this season.

Miller, a senior at Highland Park, is a definite threat to the state high school crown, to be held at Austin this week-end.

Farmer Tops Adams
Aggie Donald Farmer, playing superbly, downed Jack Adams, 7-5, 6-2 in the No. 2 singles match. Farmer's game, at its peak, was too much for Adams, especially in the final set, when the Aggie star scored placement after placement.

In the No. 3 singles encounter, Tommy West displayed an extra good ground game in trimming Ronald Complen, 6-2, 6-3. West, who hails from San Antonio, proved more offensive-minded than his younger opponent.

In the No. 4 and final singles match, Harold Gann whipped Bill Masterson in straight sets, 6-2, 6-4. Gann, a West Texas product from Sudan, was too steady for Masterson.

Doubles Combinations Win
The Aggie No. 1 doubles combination of Letson and Farmer had little trouble with Miller and Adams, clipping the Dallas team by a score of 6-2, 6-1.

In the only other close call for the Aggies, West and Gann outlasted Masterson and Bobby Henderson to take the No. 2 doubles match and final event of the day, 4-6, 7-5, 9-3.

Austinites Take Remaining Five

Texas University's powerful tennis team handed A&M its second conference defeat here Saturday afternoon, 5-1.

R. G. DeBerry, the Ag's top tennis player, came through with the only Cadet conquest of the day, defeating TU's best, Julian Oates, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

Lasting two hours and fifteen minutes, the match featured many deuce points, and was very hotly contested. DeBerry used deep forehand, and backhand drives that forced Oates to retreat to backcourt.

Then he caught Oates off guard with deft drop shots which barely cleared the net to fall out of the reach of Oates' swings.

Service DeBerry's Headache
DeBerry took the first set after breaking Oates' cannon-ball serve twice in the ninth game, then relied on his delivery to complete the set at 6-4.

On the comeback trail, Oates got the jump on the Cadet in the second set, piling up a 5-2 lead. He broke DeBerry's service to finish the set, 6-3.

DeBerry mixed forcing shots with drop shots, attacked the net consistently, and played Oates' backhand regularly to salvage the only Ag triumph after winning the final set, 6-3.

Texas Begins to Roll
In the number two singles event, Bob Duncan of the Cadets bowed to veteran Clinton Nettleton, 5-7, 0-6. Duncan played a rousing game in the first set, but Nettleton's greater court experience proved too much for the Aggie.

James Saunders was the victor over Royce Tate, 6-3, 6-1, in the number three singles event. Saunders' aggressiveness was the deciding factor.

Number four singles player, Allan Aranson, bowed to Bernard Gerhardt, 2-6, 2-6. Gerhardt's steady game and court savvy were Aranson's downfall.

Steers Take Doubles
Oates and Gerhardt teamed to down DeBerry and Tate, 6-3, 6-4, in the main doubles match of the meet. The winning duo followed blistering serves to the net to gain what is the most strategic position in doubles.

In the final clash Saunders and Nettleton defeated Aranson and Duncan, 6-2, 6-3. The winning team made most of the decisive points while playing at the net.

Leming Paces Entrants In Both Drake Hurdles

Paul Leming, Aggie soph hurdle star, upset all the experts' predictions by winning the low hurdles and placing third in the high at the Drake Relay Saturday in Des Moines, Iowa. Leming led the way for the four Aggies entered in the meet.

George Kadera, crack Aggie weight star, took second in the diacus, defeated by less than a foot by Byrl Thompson of Minnesota. Thompson's toss was 158' 7".

Hampton Thirst
J. D. Hampton couldn't overcome the mud and rain and the fast competition and had to be content with third in the two-mile after winning the event last year.

The winner was Bill McGuire of Missouri in the fast time of 9:16. He was runner-up in the mile to Wisconsin's Don Gehrman last year in the NCAA meet. Finishing second was another Missouri runner, Fox, with Hampton close behind.

Southwest Conference schools fared very poorly on the whole. Rice's crack mile relay was defeated by Oklahoma A&M in 8:16.2.

Oklahoma A&M's mile team is at full strength for the first time since it won at the Sugar Bowl January first. Rice did, however, win the 440 relay to continue their winning ways begun at Kansas last week.

Rote Captures Javelin
Tobin Rote, the Owl's quarter-back javelin ace, won that event with a 195' throw. Texas failed to win a single first as Charley Parker took third in the hundred and the Steer relay teams failed to place except for a third in the 880 relay.

Leming, whose winning low hurdles time was 24.2, beat out all competitors on the home stretch with his powerful stride. This is a good time since the race was around a curve.

Bob Hall, pre-meet favorite, failed to qualify when he took a spill in the preliminaries.
