Okla. Zoologist **Speaks** Thursday



Washington, May 2—(AP) -Admiral Forrest P. Sherman won quick approval from a House committee Monday for a \$350,000,000 Navy modernization program covering a guided-missles ship and an atomicpowered submarine. Sherman told the House Armed

Services committee that \$40,000,000 of the money will be used to convert a heavy cruiser into a guidedmissles craft. He said the ship will be used primarily against aircraft," and

declared: "We have guided missiles which are sufficiently advanced that they should be introduced into the fleet

as soon as possible. "We are not warranted in delaying any longer in getting this essential element afloat."


