Big Naval Fund Wins Approval By Committee

Washington, May 2—(AP)—Admiral Forrest P. Sherman won quick approval from a House committee Monday for a \$350,000,000 Navy modernization program covering a guided-missile ship and an atomic-powered submarine.

Sherman told the House Armed Services committee that \$40,000,000 of the money will be used to convert a heavy cruiser into a guided-missile craft.

He said the ship will be used "primarily against aircraft," and he declared:

"We have guided missiles which are sufficiently advanced that they should be introduced into the fleet as soon as possible.

"We are not warranted in delaying any longer in getting this essential element afloat."

Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) asked Sherman whether he believed the development of guided missiles has gone far enough to justify the expenditure of \$40,000,000 for such a ship.

"Very definitely," the admiral replied.

Sub in Three Years

Sherman, chief of naval operations, also told the committee that the Navy hopes to have an atomic-powered submarine in operation within three years after funds become available for it.

Presumably, that would be sometime in 1954, since the program will be financed largely from funds for the 1952 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1951.

Plans for an atom-driven submarine, theoretically capable of cruising almost indefinitely without refueling, are reported already near the blueprint stage.

The overall program includes, the construction of 112 ships, mostly small, and modernization of 30 others.

Chairman Vinson had originally called for an authorization of \$500,000,000, but this figure was cut when Sherman said the Navy's present plans contemplate the spending of a lesser amount on the modernization program.

Utility Contract Is Offered By Bryan

An offer of a new contract to sell power and water to the City of College Station was voted on favorably by the Bryan City Commission Friday. The present 10 year contract will expire May 6, according to College Station City Manager Raymond Rogers.

Under the present contract, College Station pays the City of Bryan 13 cents per 1,000 gallons for water, and buys its power from A&M College.

The new contract proposed by Bryan offers water at the same price and power for one cent per kilowatt.

College Station's city council will meet soon to discuss Bryan's offer and other power sources being considered such as Gulf States Electric Company, REA, own plant, and others, Rogers concluded.

Scouting Course Begins Tonight
