member of The Battalion staff. In 1947, he joined the staff and rose quickly from reporter, to news editor, and then to news editor.

Social and religious activities are not ignored by either of the hard working students. Kunze is a member of the Fayette County A&M Club, a member of the Student Branch of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers, a member of the A&M Press Club, and a member of the Lutheran Church choir, Missouri Synod.

Lytle was first vice-president of the Baptist Student Union Council which represented the A&M Baptist in 1947. He was second vice-president of the same organization the next year. In 1950, he was editor of The Link and also a member of the BSU quartet.

Both award winners have been recipients of the GI Bill of Rights. Blankenship has also spent time working for the Texas Game, Fish, and Oyster Commission since September of 1949. Other than from his government checks, Kunze has received no outside support to further his college career except money earned as a member of The Battalion staff.
